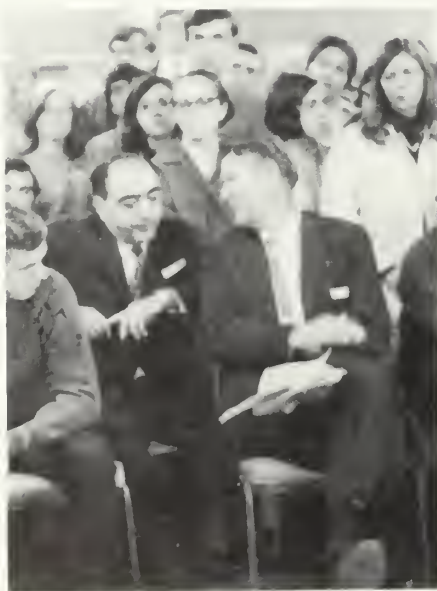

The second annual arts festival was held April 13-18 in the Student Union. Every sort of event imaginable to fit every sort of taste imaginable was presented. Norman K. Tronerua, sculptor provided an enjoyable experience for those inclined in that direction. A faculty-student exhibit was on view all week in the Day Lounge. The art demonstrations presented ranged from glass blowing to body painting. In the pot pourri category, a student "do your thing" paint-in was one of the programs offered. Music concerts ranged from a jazz group to electronic Bach. A special innovation in cinema was offered. Every day of the week new foreign and domestic films were viewed for the pleasure of our more movie-oriented students. Shakespeare readings by Tom Luddy, Jack Marshall, and Ellen Vellela provided an extra opportunity to view drama at its best. Andreas Papandreou spoke on Tuesday as the cultural series presentation. His topic was the American ideals and militarism.

The chairman for the Arts Festival was Peter Lodie. A special thanks is extended to him and his committee for the excellent program he coordinated.

CULTURAL SERIES

Throughout the 1968-1969 presentation of the Cultural Series, a variety of activities and lectures were sponsored on campus for all seeking an informed awareness of modern cultural and educational trends.

Speaking on September 24th with regard to the aims of Salem State, Dr. Frederick A. Meier was the first speaker of the Series. Expansion of the college curriculum, the costs involved in the maintenance of a state institution and prospective plans for a new library and athletic center were among the points of Dr. Meier's address. The President concluded in praise of a growing unity and good will on campus.

On October 23rd, Professor Samuel I. Hayakawa spoke to a capacity audience on the contemporary influence of language on behavior. At a second appearance on the following morning, Dr. Hayakawa commented on a "Semantic Teach-In," where several students and faculty members presented papers which related language to various aspects of society. Some of the topics included "Language in Advertising," "Obscenity in Contemporary Theatre," and "Language in Racism."



Harrington Listens To Question Of Salem Student



On December 3rd, the Series stirred discussion of a most controversial topic as Michael Harrington spoke on "Poverty in the United States." A Socialist and self-proclaimed radical, Harrington is the author of *The Other America* and *Toward A Democratic Left*. Having lived with Mexican-American Immigrant workers in California and the unemployed miners of Appalachia, Harrington spoke with extensive authority on the poverty situation. Among the focal points of his discussion were the "Job Generation Theory," the so-called "Free Enterprise" attack on poverty and the Nixon and L.B.J. theories for poverty relief.

Citing but a few of the programs presented by the Cultural Series for individual growth, it is clear that the Series completely fulfills its motivating commitment to the value of ideas.

Also included in this committee are both faculty and administration, as well as students. A motion has been passed by the Student Congress to increase student participation in this committee.



SOCIAL COMMITTEE

Perhaps the most enjoyable of all standing committees is the Social Committee. Co-Chaired by Jim Murphy, Jack Wilson and Jack Quinn, this committee is responsible for such events as Homecoming Weekend, the Christmas Formal and Winter Weekend. It also sponsors other social functions for the pleasure of dorm students as well as for the commuters. Perhaps one of the most functional committees in the college is the Student Services Committee. With Gail Phillips as chairman, this group serves the students in many helpful areas. It is responsible for the regulation of sign-posting, running a tutoring program in conjunction with Dean Reilly; and in the future an Information Center is planned. Another aspect of the widening interests of the college is seen by the work accomplished in the Film Committee. It brings to the students outstanding films for both pleasure and artistic tastes. This committee is headed by Michael Moran.



Thursday, October 31, began an exciting weekend of music, comedy and dancing. The Duke Ellington Concert was probably the greatest success of all the events. Friday's feature was a pleasant square dance for S.S.C.'s country folk. The following day was a whirl-wind of a soccer game between the alumni and varsity; a cook-out in front of the Student Union; a Peabody Hall Open House; a Bowditch Hall "Recreation Room," and a mixer with "A Bundle of Joy" and "Teddy and the Pandas" performing. Sunday was highlighted by "The American Evolution" and Mort Sahl whose performances made a perfect ending to a marvelous weekend.

Winter Weekend was one of the year's greatest successes. The weekend began on February 20th in Scarborough Fair with entertainment by "McKendree Spring." On Friday evening "Sam and Dave" electrified a capacity crowd of 1500 to the rhythm of their all time hits, "Soul Man" and "Hold On." The Kaffein Serpent, a make-shift coffee house in Bowditch Hall, served a buffet supper Saturday night and later, featured a concert by McKendree Spring, as well as dancing to the beat of "The Insiders." An Open House was sponsored on Sunday afternoon with the free use of bowling, pool, and other facilities of the Student Union. Winter Weekend activities closed Sunday evening with the presentation of the film, "The Spy That Came In From The Cold."

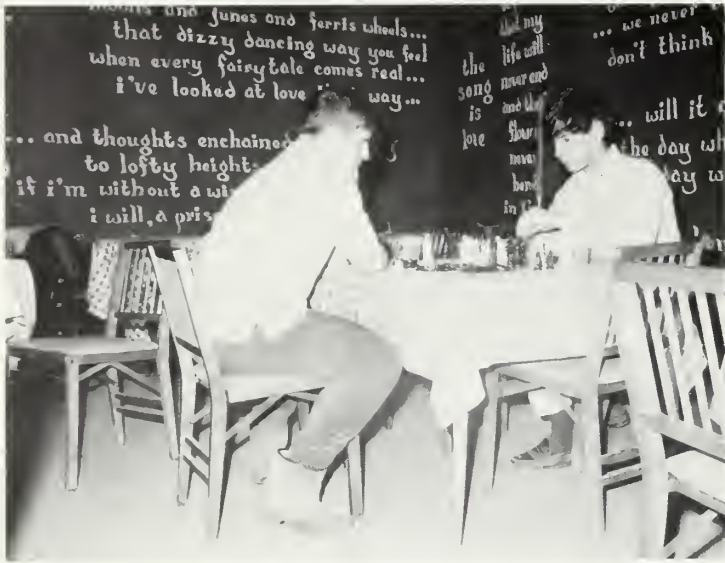

Among the aims of the Book Club at Salem State is a fulfillment of student interests in the literary arts and in modern theatre. Throughout the year, the club purchases a number of books which are made available to club members at any time.

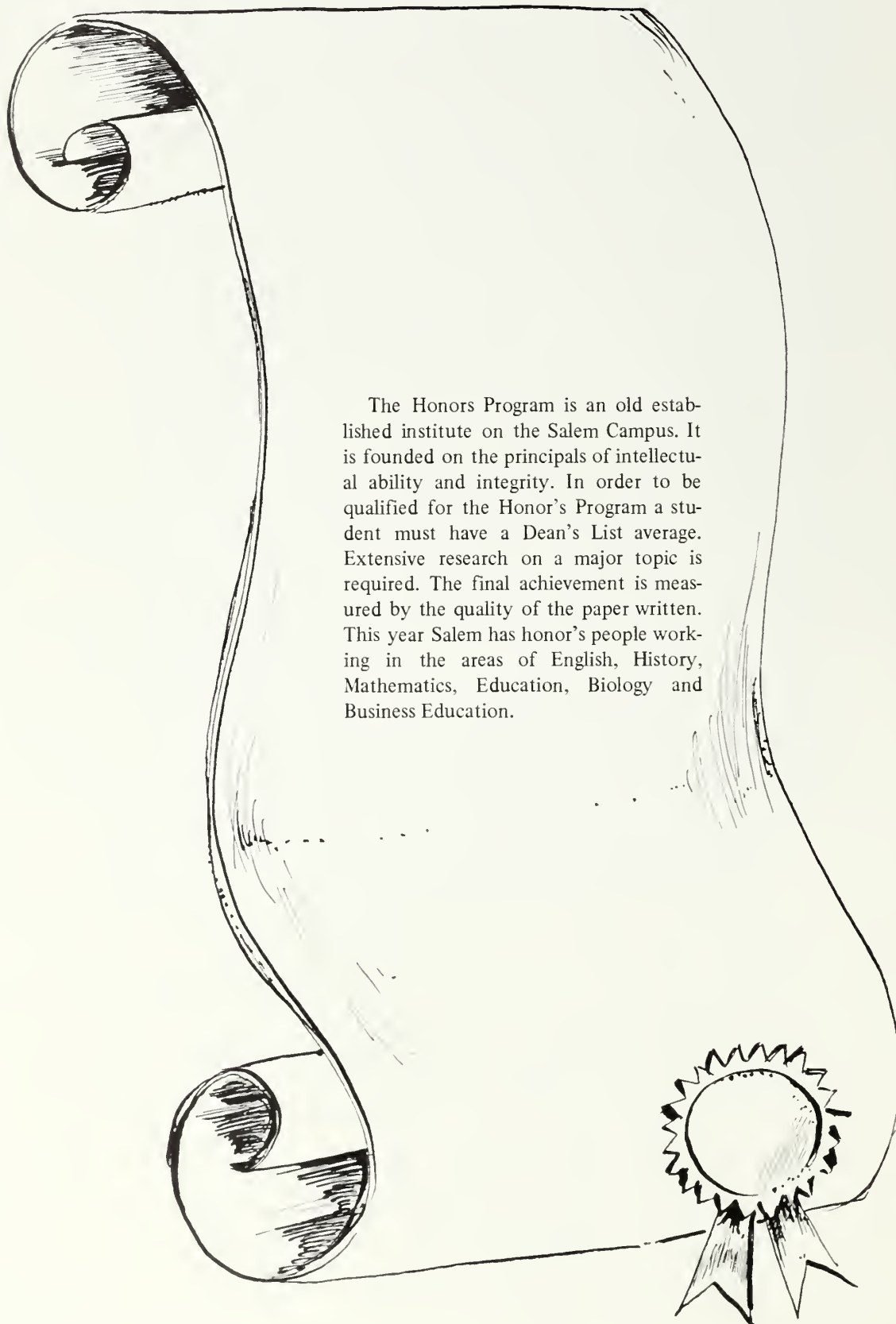

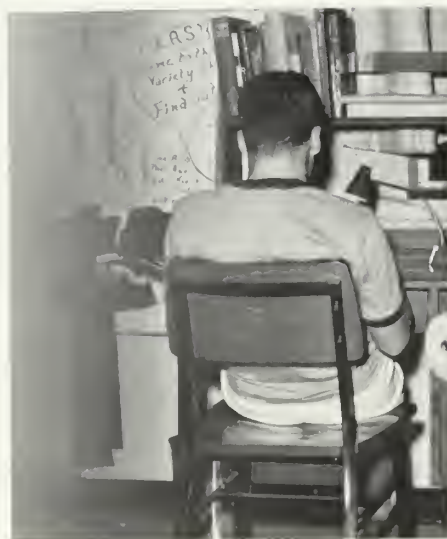

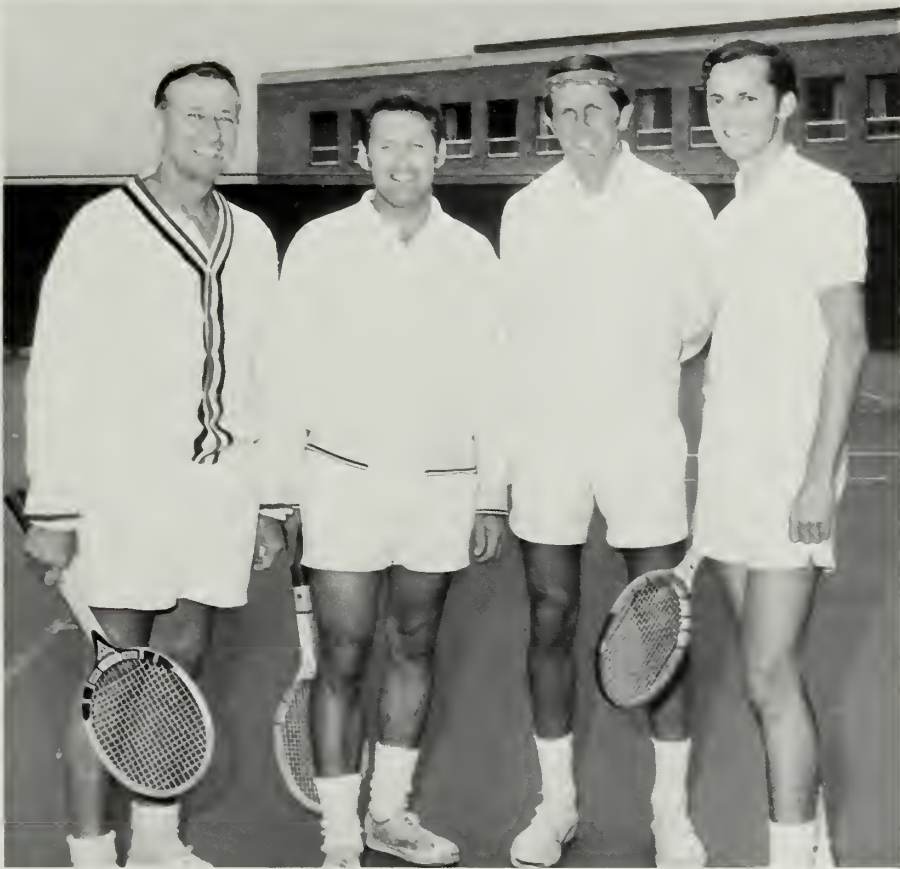
TENNIS TOURNAMENT

It was all Bridgewater in the second overtime as the young Vikings simply ran out of gas to give Bridgewater a hard earned 89-82 victory over Salem.

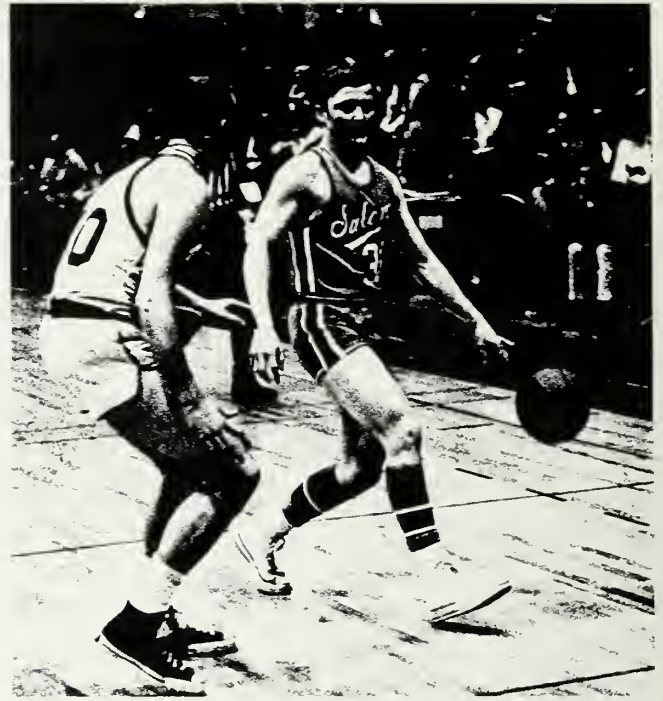

The Salem State Varsity Pucksters skated to a 12-5-1 record and a bid to the N.A.I.A. National Championships at Saulte Ste. Marie, Michigan.

Carrying nine sophomores on a 17-man squad, it looked like a rebuilding year for Coach Barry Urbanski. But the Vikings, never overcome, went on to their best season yet.

Salem opened at the University of Vermont and took the game into overtime, winning 5-4 on Dave Pekins unassisted goal. In this game, all of Salem's goals were scored by sophomores: two by Bruce Jangro, two by Dave Pekins, and one by Joe Gallagher.

Salem next journeyed to Worcester to do battle with Holy Cross and returned home with a disappointing 7-7 tie. Holy Cross' Junior sensation Larry Murphy scored five goals and their goalie kicked away 60 Salem shots, 26 in the third period, to keep the game knotted. Coach Urbanski summed it up after the game, "We had 60 shots at the Holy Cross net and they scored five breakaway goals. There's no excuse."

Salem hit the road for their third game of the season against Merrimack, the defending E.C.A.C. Division II champs. Sophomore Rick Boucher scored two goals in the first period to give Salem an encouraging 2-0 lead at the end of that stanza as goalie Glen Melton had 16 saves. But Merrimack proved too strong as they scored two in the second period and three more in the third while Salem could only manage one in the third and came out on the short end of a 5-3 score. Of special note in this game was the excellent performance of Glenn Melton in the Salem goal as he turned back 35 Merrimack shots.

Salem's fourth away game in a row was at A.I.C. in Springfield and the Vikings played a spectacular game before falling to defeat 4-3. Once again goal-tending excelled as junior Dean Humphries turned away 51 of the Yellow-Jackets shots. Defenseman Mike Gilligan played another of his tremendous games, foiling many of A.I.C.'s rushes while tallying twice.

The Vikings' most disappointing loss came at the hands of Colby College. With each team fighting tooth-and-nail for a playoff spot, Colby came from behind in a see-saw battle to down Salem 6-5 in sudden-death overtime. A 9-3 victory over Lowell Tech primed Salem for a rematch with a rough-and-tumble A.I.C. squad. With Salem's playoff chances still alive, the game was a must. The Yellow-Jackets burst open a 1-1 tie in the second period and rolled to a 12-3 lead. With ten minutes left, Salem began its comeback and scored seven goals before the game was halted under protest at 19:38 because fighting had erupted.

In the final tally, Salem finished fifth in E.C.A.C. Division II, just out of a playoff spot. This is particularly admirable since this is only Salem's second year in conference competition. But the Vikings did earn the right to represent the East in the N.A.I.A. Championships.

The team works out at least two hours daily and competes in all four events: floor exercise: a series of combined tumbling and dance movements; vaulting; rebounding off a Rheuter board over a horse in positions such as lay out squatt, straddle and handspring; balance beam: a performance of runs, jumps, leaps, turns, poses and tumbling on a four inch width wooden beam and uneven parallel bars; a series of predominately hanging and swinging exercises transferring between bars—one high and one low. Their performance on each piece is scored on a basis of ten points and is judged on its originality, difficulty, fluency, perfection of execution, and beauty of combinations.

Competing on an intercollegiate basis, this year the coed gymnasts met with teams from Southern Connecticut, Springfield, University of Massachusetts, Ithaca, Courtland, and Westchester. Also, at the close of the competitive season, the girls participated in the Collegiate I and II divisions at the Eastern competition held at East Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania.
