President's Message

I like to think that "Vaya con Dios" became a popular song not only because of the poignant melody to which the lyric was written but also because of the significance of the title whose translation, as you know, is "Go with God." In this short message I am trying to say farewell, but I want to express more than is contained in such phrases as "Au Revoir" or "Auf Wiedersehen." I want to wish you the kind of success which comes with peace of mind, peace of soul. Whatever the cynic may declare to the contrary, this is best assured when God is with you.

The profession which I have left and which you are about to enter has charted the course of civilization since the beginning of time. As you are conscious of the achievements of your predecessors, so should you be mindful of the Source of your strength. I interpret the word in the same sense of its derivation as I bid you "Goodbye."

IN a limited sense, the 1954 CLIPPER records in picture and text our activities at Salem; however, in a broader sense it reveals much that can neither be seen nor read, save in individual memories. The unseen and unwritten value of this Annual lies in its perennial ability to open wide with each page that is turned, some half-closed door of memory, to clear some dim by-path of our four years' journey, to revive ambitions, friendships, and mirthful recollections. We offer you these visible and invisible records in the hope that you may find them rewarding.

We, the Centennial Seniors, look in two directions, casting a backward glance over the preface to the present and a forward glance to the future beyond Commencement Day. Looking to the past, we have selected 1854, 1876, the Eighteen-Eighties, and the so-called "Gay Nineties" as periods best illustrating the spirit of the century in which Salem was born and grew up. We look forward with a feeling of mingled pride and humility in our achievements, but with the inevitable wistfulness that comes with the realization that we shall no longer gather as a group within her walls.

Salem's walls bear the venerability of tradition. Age alone, however, does not add inches to the stature of a college; unless growth comes as a result of understanding, high ideals, and ordered progress, it is a mere mushroom growth. Colleges of mushroom growth do not survive to celebrate centennials. Salem has survived and grown in orderly fashion as successive years have slipped away, and generations of men and women in increasing numbers have gone forth to justify Salem's faith in them and to give proof of the superior training she offers.



In September, 1854, the State Normal School at Salem came into being as a result of the far-sighted vision, courage, and zeal of the founder of pioneer public schools for the training of teachers in the United States, Horace Mann. At that time, the schools dedicated to the training of teachers in the United States numbered but eight.

The Salem school began its career with a faculty consisting of a principal, Dr. Richard Edwards, an assistant, Miss Martha Kingman, and fewer than one hundred students. Since that time more than twelve thousand students have been enrolled, of whom approximately seven thousand have been graduated. The Centennial Class, numbering one hundred forty members, will be awarded the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education, with specialization in the fields of Business, Junior High School, and Elementary Education.

As one reviews the small beginnings, he cannot help but be proud of the achievements of the past century. It is a striking example of the influence of Horace Mann on thousands of young men and women who feel as he did that the educator's calling is "the highest possible one in a republic." Like him, they enter upon it "with the deepest awe and a sense of the highest responsibility, gladly relinquishing . . . honors, and wealth for its arduous and interesting duty."

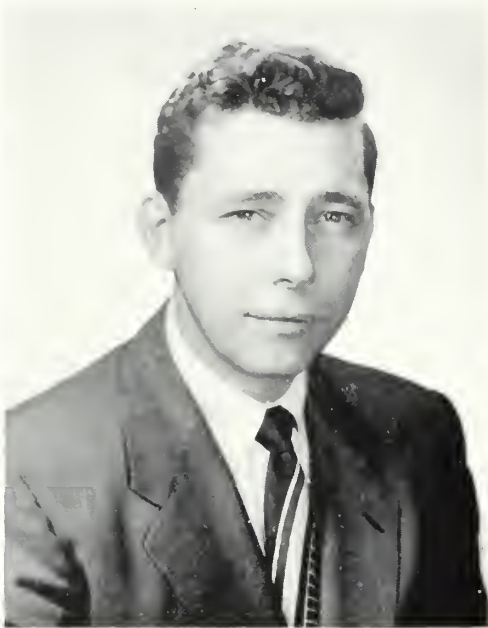

Stimulated by the Spirit of '76, independence flourished in America. One hundred years after the first Fourth of July, the United States gave striking proof of the many advances that had been made during her first century of existence. Schoolmasters were accorded respect, and the school mistress was treated with deference. Education and the nation walked hand in hand along the road of democracy.

CENTENNIAL FRESHMEN

In the year 2000, in the glass-domed observatory atop the famed science building of the State Teachers College at Salem, a group of students were gathered around a spherical machine. As a project for Science 491, which was to correlate history and science in one report, they faced the problem of examining the newly donated Time Machine. After weeks of indecision, it was agreed that they turn the years back to 1950 and explore the events that characterized the four years of the famous Centennial Class.

Pencils poised, the students were ready to record. Eyes on the screen, amid a hush over the room, tense with excitement, they awaited that decisive turn of the knob. And then it happened; the machine crackled with electricity, as a blurred image came across the screen, and time turned backward in his flight to 1950.

The events that first appeared on the Time Machine were those of the day on which the Centennial Class, as freshmen, began to be oriented to college life. On Orientation Day a most sincere welcome was extended to them by President Edward A. Sullivan. This warm and enthusiastic greeting was just a sample of the friendly way in which he was to treat them during their first three and one-half years at Salem. Never could it be said that he was impersonal. Salemites were not just classes, masses, and groups to him; they were individual personalities whom he could call by name, and their welfare was a matter of the deepest concern to him.

A roar of laughter echoed through the observatory as the viewers were shown the Centennial Class in their INITIATION REGALIA. The ensemble consisted of twenty pigtailed bestrewn with colored yarn hanging to the wearer's waist, unmatched shoes and socks, rags, long underwear, tin cans, used teabags, carrot corsages, and buckets containing newspapers, gloves, and toothbrushes lest the lowly freshmen contaminate the "Most Honorable Sophomores."

The sumptuous feast, climaxing the week of mirthful horrors, next attracted the viewers' eyes. Prizes were awarded to Elementary Freshman I for the most original table, and Commercial Freshman II took honors for the most timely table. The entertainment following the banquet was, to put it mildly,

unusual, as was to be expected when the famous Sullivan-Schlegel team demonstrated its histrionic ability.

The banquet faded, and across the screen flashed posters, campaign speeches promises, and over-all turmoil as the Centennial Class endeavored to elect Freshman Class Officers. The offices were filled by Rosemary McHugh, *President*; Fred Zani, *First Vice-President*; Charles Koulopoulos, *Second Vice-President*; Bette Derouin, *Secretary*; and Dick Zani, *Treasurer*.

Strains of Christmas carols reached the ears of the viewers, and next the Centennial Freshmen were shown setting their mark in the Christmas Pageant. The Thespians were: Thomas F. Grady, Dick Santos, Mary Pratt, Reggie McIntyre, Louis Fittante, Fred Zani, and Marjorie Ells.

The viewers next saw a Centennial Freshman, Phil Sullivan, distinguished delegate to the conference of the Eastern States Association of Professional Schools for Teachers at the Hotel New Yorker, New York.

A streak of lightning flashed across the time screen; dismal rain and heavy clouds vied for dominance. As the haze began to clear, the group of students could see the Centennial Freshmen, a sorry looking lot, haggard from study and cramming, going in to take their first mid-years. Result — success and exhaustion.

Pencils raced across loose-leaf paper lest they miss a single incident of the Play Day at Lowell Teachers College when Salem's prestige was maintained solely by the Centennial Freshmen Women, the only group to emerge victorious over the Lowell hoopsters.

Fierce animals, separated from the mob by cages, glared as the freshmen danced at their annual frolic in Chapel Hall on April 20, 1951. Madame Zabar, an imported fortune-teller, held a group spellbound as she prophesied their futures for a trifling sum.

Once again, campaign speeches and political promises were the order of the day. The new leaders for the following year were seen to be: Dick Santos, *President*, Al Tangney, *Vice-President*, Mary Macera, *Secretary*, and Lorraine Cooke, *Treasurer*.

A dreaded but decisive moment awaited the Freshmen as they launched forth on finals about the first week in June, 1951. Faces as they appeared on the time screen showed mixed feelings of hope tinged with fear. However, they had little to worry about, for the majority of the class succeeded in proving that progress had been made; therefore, it was a merry Class Day in June, when the Centennial Freshmen proudly turned their capes from yellow to blue telling the world they were ready for another year.

CENTENNIAL SOPHOMORES

The students viewing the Time Machine edged forward in their seats in anticipation as it sputtered its way into the second year of college life. Now the tables were turned. Meek little freshmen were replaced by demanding Sophomores. The viewers were astonished, to say the least, to hear the Almighty Sophomores shouting, "Blitz, you insignificant Freshmen!" It was doom for the freshmen as the Sophomores lowered the boom! The Centennial Sophomores had donned their superior air on Monday, September 24, 1951, as the lowly freshmen bowed, sang, blitzed, blacked out, and polished sneakers for their lords and masters. The fun-packed, food-packed banquet ended initiation for another year.

Soft fluffy clouds and star-clustered skies next formed a background on the screen, and the on-lookers got a glimpse of *Dream Time*, the Sophomore informal dance, obviously a social and financial success. Songs such as "I'll See You in my Dreams," and "Dream," both in glittering letters along the walls and in the selection of music played for the evening, served to carry out the theme.

On December 4, 1951, Jean Charshoodian and Louise Kozel were applauded warmly at the quarterly meeting of the North Shore A.C.E. for their violin duet, *Jesu Bambino*.

Lyrics of the "Camptown Races" were suddenly heard and the scene changed as a minstrel show dazzled the watchers' eyes. Stars included Phil Sullivan, Herb Schlegel, and Mike Fioretti. The date was December 6, 1951.

After the semi-annual storm of mid-years subsided, tranquillity reigned and honor came to Salem in the form of Ann Floyd's "Peace on the Sea," which was published in the Annual Anthology of *College Poetry*.

The appearance of the hammer and sickle on the screen sent a shudder up and down the spines of the students. It seemed that an attempt to overthrow student government threatened Salem Teachers College. Could Communism by trickery and violence cause the destruction of Salem? The Sophomore Class answered an emphatic "No!" on the nights of April 16 and 17 when they presented "Movietime S.T.C." in the Horace Mann Training School, with a sparkling cast ably directed by Phil Sullivan and Herb Schlegel.

The scene changed, and political geniuses were once more planning specific stratagems. Gerrymandering and rallies were employed by all the nominees and their agents, but the positions were captured by: Dick Zani, *President*; Lenny Zani, *Vice-President*; Mary Driscoll, *Secretary*, and George Ellison, *Treasurer*.



Could that be the Centennial Class wearing morose and sober faces? Such a somber attitude could mean only one thing. It was June, and finals were upon them. Needless to say, despite much anxiety, few casualties fell by the wayside.

June was not only the month in which finals occurred, but it was also the one in which Move-Up Exercises were held on Class Day. On a memorable day the Centennial Sophomores completed their second year of college life, bade underclassmen days goodbye, and traditionally turned their capes from blue to green in a symbolic greeting to the glorious upperclass days that lay ahead.

CENTENNIAL JUNIORS

Once more a vibrant summer gave way to a gloriously-hued fall. Leaves turned to brilliant shades of red and sunburnt gold, and the Centennial Junior Class turned their backs on summer and faced the new year with the dignity befitting upperclassmen and with the eagerness that came with being so close to the status of seniors.

Viewers of the Time Machine saluted Kay Kelleher, who had become national Secretary of F.T.A. for 1952-1953, after an election which had been held at Michigan State Normal College in Ypsilanti, the previous July. Kay also received the distinction of being asked to participate in the Northeast regional conference to be held at Swampscott in May, 1953.

Blares of "Anchors Aweigh" seem to be trying to drown out "The Caissons Song." To the astonished on-lookers it seemed as if the entire male population at Salem had divided itself and donned the garb of the U.S. Army or Navy. Were these stalwart young men ready to travel over land and sea to save their country? "Not this time," answered the machine as it unreeled its tale. The M.A.A. made history on the evenings of November 24 and 25 as it presented its first show of the Army *vs.* the Navy entitled *Mule vs. Goat*. The new official song of the Men's Athletic Association was the closing number of the show:

To the chairs down in the smoker,
To our new and modern gym,
To the pleasant shower room we love so well,
Stand the M.A.A. assembled
With their voices raised on high,
And the magic of their singing casts its spell.

A totally different picture now presented itself. It seemed that buckets, brooms, and mops were being brought to school by Salemites clad in dungarees and old shirts. The date was November 28, 1952. All hands were on deck for a general field day. The Centennial Class along with all the other classes brought war implements ready for action. Purpose: Preparation for revisitation by the representatives of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education on December 3, 4, and 5. As a result of this refurbishing of our ancient building and the excellent impression made by students and faculty, Salem was accredited by this committee.

Next the students saw a caricature of Uncle Sam who, was saying, "I Want You," as he called upon Charlie Morrison of Commercial Junior II to assist in the Air Force.

On November 13, 1952, the following members of Kappa Delta Phi received first and second degrees: Frank Sweeney, Phil Sullivan, Denny Palmer, George Ellison, Dick Brown, Herb Schlegel, Murray Gerber, and Dick Briana.

Bagpipes now vibrated against the ears of the students to the air of *Bluebells of Scotland*. The date was December 1, 1952, and Thomas Grady combined forces with Henry Cant to present a Scottish program for the Book Club. Mr. Cant recited poems by Robert Burns, and Mr. Grady played appropriate selections on the bagpipes.

The students in the observatory marveled at the change in the attitude assumed by the Centennial Juniors as they set out for their week of mid-year exams. Determined rather than frightened, they launched forth to prove their achievement. A milestone in the lives of Elementary and Junior High students was to be set in the near future, for Practice-Teaching would be upon them from January to June. This was something different, looked upon by the students with mixed feelings of wonder, timid hope, and fearful anticipation.

An exciting basketball game now filled the screen. After many moments of spectacular play, victorious Salem opened the basketball season with a 54-51 score. The Clippers were led by Joe Clarkin, "Whiz" Ryder, Herb Schlegel, George Ellison, George Gibbons, Denny Palmer, and Dick Brown.

By now, the students viewing the Time Machine had become accustomed to seeing elections taking place in Chapel Hall, but this time another type of voting was going on. The outcomes showed that the class of '54 voted to continue Junior Week, commencing on April 20, with the traditional Junior Prom on April 24 as the climax of the social whirl. The program was as follows: Monday, Dinner and Theater Party to see "New Faces of '52" at the Colonial Theater in Boston; Tuesday, Weiner Roast and Barn Dance; Wednesday, Roller Skating Party; Thursday, Cake Sale, and Friday, the Junior Prom.

Not long after this, the *Clipper* made ready to sail out of port in 1954, as the Juniors signed on helmsmen. They were: Marilyn Flaherty, *Editor-in-Chief*; Arlene Goyea, *Assistant Editor*; Bette Derouin and Estelle Pisano, *Literary Editors*; Janet Aucoin and Jean Dallaire, *Art Editors*; Lenny Zani and Mary Kavanagh, *Photography Editors*; Florence Marotta and Helen Hayes, *Advertising Managers*; Dennis Palmer, *Business Manager*; Patricia Barry, *Secretary*; Dorrie Mazzarella, Kay Kelleher, Stephen Walsh, Mary Shoulder, and Joyce Ellen, *Associate Editors*.

Then the viewers got a glimpse of the Junior Prom on the evening of April 24, 1953. As the high point of an evening embracing confection-colored gowns accented with pastel corsages, soft lights and romantic music, Senior Class Officers were announced in the Surrey Room of the Hotel Touraine in Boston as: Lenny Zani, *President*; George Ellison, *Vice-President*; Lorraine Bragg, *Secretary*; and Lorraine Cooke, *Treasurer*. Loveliest of the lovelies, Jean Dallaire, won a queen's crown that evening.

The students of the year 2000 saw that the Junior Year of the Centennial Class had been a memorable one. Results of the finals in June proved to most of the class that it had also been a successful one. Junior Women, selected for their poise, personality, and scholarship, received the distinction of form-

ing the Daisy and Laurel Chains for Move-Up Exercises on a Class Day that held a thrilling moment for the Juniors. Following the symbolic turn of the cape, from green to the coveted maroon they faced the stairs, at last they were upper-classmen, Seniors, ready to assume the responsibility of setting the mode and tone of college life at Salem, ready to lead the way.

CENTENNIAL SENIORS

The return to Salem after a carefree summer found Seniors experiencing mixed emotions, sorrow because this was the last time they would return in a body, and exuberance because at last they were approaching and almost touching the goal that would enable them to go out and teach. With dignity and sincere pleasure they commenced the year that would end with Commencement.

The first problem presented itself to the seniors in the form of a question Who would be the first to give Chapel? The answer—Dorrie Mazzarella. There she was behind the rostrum, fearless and courageous, as she spoke to the entire student body. The on-lookers smiled as all her friends rushed up to congratulate her on her speech, and wished that they were she, now that it was over, though they had been grateful previously that they had not been chosen as the first victim.

Cowboy suits, ten-gallon hats, and bucking broncos announced the theme of forthcoming senior class show. "Go West, Young Man, go West." This saying was the familiar battle-cry of the Senior Class as it prepared to present to the faculty and student body a musical extravaganza on the stage of the Horace Mann Training School, November 23 and 24, 1953.

The words "Preface to the Present" next marched across the time machine screen. It is October 16, 1953, and the Clipper Dance is taking place. Billy Rich and his Millionaires entertained the entire crew from the hours of 8-12 P.M. in Chapel Hall. Huge tintypes of years gone by and old-fashioned lanterns were used to mingle past scenes with present ones.

The last announcement President Sullivan made to the college was in the form of adding another laurel crown — that of the accreditation of Salem, the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This was quite an honor, since it now ranked Salem as one of four among the Teachers Colleges in New England to be so recognized.

An unusual sight now greeted the eyes of the spectators. It had always been the custom of seniors to don the official garb of cap and gown during the latter part of May, but because of the fact that their beloved president, Edward A. Sullivan, was to retire at the end of December, the Senior Class voted to be invested by him on Thursday, November 19, 1953.

Following Investiture, a formal farewell was extended to President Sullivan at a testimonial banquet in the Salem Armory at which time he was presented with a beautiful marine painting by the noted artist, Anthony Thieme of Rockport. The musical part of the program, songs by the Glee Club, under the direction of Mr. Clifford, was broadcast over Station WFSX in Salem. The principal speakers were Bishop Eric MacKenzie, a lifelong friend of President Sullivan, the Rev. Fr. Joseph R. N. Maxwell, President of Boston College, and Dr. Patrick J. Sullivan of the Department of Education.

Static once again seemed to distort the picture a trifle, but the viewers remembered previous sights like this and realized that it was nothing but mid-year exams once again. The usual calm followed, and out of Salem's port another ship set sail bearing the Commercial Seniors toward varied distant harbors for their practice teaching.

During their absence at a memorable Chapel presentation that the on-lookers next beheld, the triumphant basketball champions of the New England Teachers College Conference, our Salem Clippers, presented their trophy to Mr. Lowrey, their coach, who in turn bestowed it on the beloved acting-president, Bruce F. Jeffery.

One week later, on April 1, 1954, again the scene was Chapel Hall, and Dr. Patrick J. Sullivan, Director of the Division presented to the faculty and student body their new president, Dr. Frederick A. Meier, formerly of the State Teachers College at Bridgewater. His friendly address was followed by enthusiastic applause. Salem welcomed him and wished for him many years of distinguished leadership.

Once more the scene was Chapel Hall, and Marilyn Flaherty, the *Editor-in-Chief*, was presiding at the dedication of the Centennial *Clipper*, honoring three of Salem's leaders, Edward A. Sullivan, Bruce F. Jeffery, and Frederick A. Meier. Marilyn also presented her staff with their yearbooks and roses, thanking them for their successful efforts in compiling a book which held between its covers a record of many happy hours.

The banner of the Beta Chapter of Kappa Delta Phi now appeared on the screen. In the Centennial year all activities were directed by: Dick Zani, *President*; Denny Palmer, *Vice-President*; Herb Schlegal, *National Vice-President*, and Greg Drake, *House Captain*. Never before this year had so much been accomplished by this Salem organization. Among the many *firsts* shown to the observers were the following:

A Fraternity house was acquired.

A Newsletter was circulated to Alumni and Servicemen Brothers.

By means of a raffle an air-cooled film projector was donated to the training school.

Faculty members were invited to become honorary members.

In the Hotel Edison at an Initiation Banquet President Edward A. Sullivan was made an honorary member and presented with a ship's clock.

Dr. Leo Hennessey and Mr. Lawrence Lowrey were made members of Kappa Delta Phi.

The highlight of the events which held the attention of the watchers was the five-day celebration of Inauguration, Centennial, and Commencement that climaxed the most momentous year in Salem's history. The screen fairly glowed as the day-by-day activities flashed past.

June 2, Class Day, ushered in the festivities. This affair had been moved from June 8 to June 2, because of the manifold activities planned for this unusual year. The solemn Last Chapel, conducted by Vice-President George Ellison, was followed by the colorful Move-Up exercises at which the Seniors, after singing under the direction of Phillip Sullivan, marched up the steps for the last time and threw their farewell roses to the eager underclassmen. President Leonard Zani gave the Senior banner to Paul Butler, President of the Junior Class, and received the Alumni banner from the Alumni President in a meaningful ceremony.

Changing rapidly from academic costume, the Seniors journeyed to the Hotel Edison in Lynn for the luncheon. Then came in swift succession the return to Salem, the Ivy Exercises, and the Senior Tea for relatives and friends.

June 3 began with an academic procession at the Saltonstall School to usher in the formal inauguration of Salem's new president, Dr. Frederick A. Meier, in the presence of faculty, seniors, underclassmen, and distinguished guests. The chief speaker was the well-known Dr. Clement R. Maxwell, President of the State Teachers College at Bridgewater. Immediately following the Inauguration, a reception was held in Chapel Hall, which was filled to capacity with well wishers. Perhaps buoyed up by the impressiveness and gaiety of the occasion, the ever-enthusiastic students and faculty returned to the Saltonstall School early in the evening for the long-awaited Centennial Banquet where their beloved President Emeritus, Edward A. Sullivan, acted as toastmaster with his customary humor and scholarliness. Dr. George Schuster, President of Hunter College, gave the address. Later in the evening, the guests, still carried on the wave of excitement, returned to their homes for a brief respite before the crowded days that were to follow.

Friday, June 4, Student Day, was shown as another red-letter day in the history of the Centennial Class. It began with a series of tableaux, staged by the various classes and viewed by visitors and judges, who surely had no inkling of the fact that it would be viewed with interest fifty years later to time-screen observers. The Seniors presented the tableau depicting the last period of the college's century of achievement, 1929-1954. It was during this period, that a great change was made in the title and character of the school. In 1929, the Salem Normal School became the State Teachers College at Salem.

Immediately following the judging of the tableaux, the Centennial Carnival was in full swing on the campus. Made hungry by the sight of the picnic lunch enjoyed under a marquee by students and guests, the watchers munched on supersonic candy bars. Refreshed, all gathered on the lawn for the outdoor auction. As soon as the auctioneer had disposed of student-donated articles, the athletes of the college donned their sports regalia and engaged in various outdoor sports. The observers next saw the all-exhausted, but undaunted participants and onlookers gather around the speakers' platform for the presentation of awards.

Suddenly the scene changed from the now-familiar Salem campus to the grand ballroom of a luxurious hotel. The memory of the "Gay Nineties" has become legendary, because of the conscious novelty in art, originality, and daring exploits that marked its progress. Previous decades that had produced non-imaginative works were outdistanced in this exciting period which may be interpreted in terms of personality. It was an epoch of experiment, marked by some degree of achievement, an epoch singularly rich in ideas, personal genius, and social intelligence, but singularly deficient in balance and common sense. Pursuit of fads and fancies in all fields led to exhaustion and some remorse.



Fads and fancies in education came and went, but Salem pursued a steady middle course, preserving the best of the old and adopting some of the new. As time went on, the physical plant became inadequate for increased numbers and activities. Ground was broken for the new building of the Salem Normal School at the intersection of Loring Avenue and Lafayette Street, in 1893, and the work was completed in 1896. In 1932, the Salem Normal School became the State Teachers College at Salem. Education never stops; like democracy itself, it requires unremitting care and watchfulness. Institutions like Salem go on, because, under capable leadership, they adapt themselves to the times yet never lose sight of their goal. As we remember her small beginnings, we cannot help but be proud of Salem's achievements in the past century and look forward confidently to an era of even greater service.

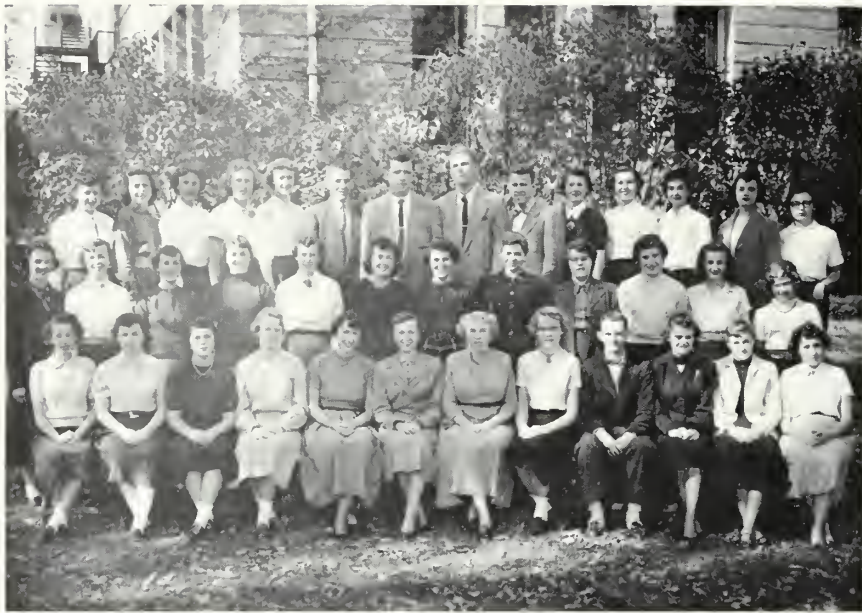

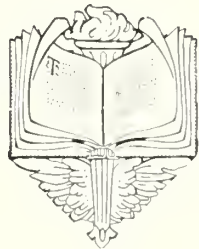
