Salem State Athletics Posts Highest Single Year Winning Percentage

1993-94 was a milestone year for the Salem State College intercollegiate athletic program. The 19 varsity sports combined to post a school record .681 winning percentage which eclipsed the previous highwater mark of .661 set in 1985-86.

Salem State teams posted a combined 194 victories against just 88 defeats. A total of 10 contests ended in a tie. Six sports won 20 or more games. They were baseball (25), softball (24), ice hockey (23), women's basketball (22), men's basketball (20) and volleyball (20). Eight sports represented the College in postseason tournament play while seven captured Massachusetts State College Athletic Association Conference (MASCAC) titles. Five teams were selected for the NCAA tournament with the ice hockey and golf teams placing fourth and eighth, respectively, at the national championship round.

Forty-five Salem State student athletes earned All-MASCAC honors while a record seven were selected MASCAC Players of the Year. They were Steve Stapleton (baseball), Kristen Davis (women's basketball), Kurt Mallett (ice hockey), Norman James (men's soccer), Marcy Maglio (women's soccer), Jen Wells (softball) and Yvonne Rep (volleyball).

Salem State honored its own top student athletes by citing Joseph Bonvie (ice hockey) and Kristen Davis as the Male and Female Student Athletes of the Year and selecting Dawn Leary (soccer/softball) and Julie Goodwin (track/basketball) and Steve Stapleton and Kurt Mallett President's Cup Award recipients as the College's top athletes for 1993-94.

Goodwin, a senior, topped Salem State's list of individual accomplishments when she soared 18'7" to capture the NCAA Division 3 national long jump championship in Naperville, Illinois.

Dr. Stanley P. Cahill, Vice President for Student Life, was presented the Richard O'Keefe Memorial Award given annually to an avid supporter of and contributor to Salem State College intercollegiate athletics. by Tom Roundy, Salem State S.I.D.

SSC started the 1993-94 Smith Cup race strong in the fall season by winning conference crowns in men's soccer (16-1-1), volleyball (20-9/tri-champs) and women's soccer (10-6-4/co-champs). Men's cross country also contributed points by placing second. Men's soccer returned to the NCAA tournament after a one-year hiatus and lost in a first round penalty kick shootout decision while the women's soccer team was dealt a similar fate as its male counterparts when it was defeated in a first round PK shootout in the ECAC-New England Tournament. Volleyball was overlooked for postseason tournament play despite sharing the regular season league title, winning the MASCAC tournament and posting a 20-win season.

However, as in the past, the winter season proved to be Salem's most successful. The men's and women's basketball teams finished first while the ice hockey team posted its 20th MASCAC title. All three programs advanced to postseason play with ice hockey (23-6-3) placing fourth at the NCAA Final Four, women's basketball (22-5) losing in the first round to eventual NCAA Final Four participant Wheaton (MA) College and men's basketball (20-8) making it to the semifinals of the ECAC New England Tournament. The three SSC winter MASCAC titles produced a combined record of 27-1.

The baseball team (25-5) continued SSC's success by capturing the league title for only the second time since 1973 and posting a school record 22-game winning streak. The softball team (24-6) contributed to SSC's Smith Cup point total by placing second to Bridgewater who went on to the NCAA Tournament and finished as runner-up to national champion Trenton State. The SSC baseball and softball teams were selected for postseason tournament play with baseball appearing in the NCAA New England Regional and the softball team competing in the ECAC North Tournament.

The 1993-94 year produced 45 All-MASCAC performers and numerous All-New England and All-America selections for SSC. Twelve of the 19 Viking sports represented SSC in team or individual postseason tournament competition. Not to be overlooked was the golf team's unprecedented 26th consecutive national championship tournament appearance. The Viking linksters, who placed 8th in the 20-team field, were led by junior Jay Ruschioni, who earned All-America honors for the third straight year. Senior All-America long jumper Julie Goodwin joined an illustrious group when she soared 18'7" to capture the NCAA Division 3 title in Naperville, Illinois.

"People ask me how do we win so much," said Galaris. "The climb to the top is easier compared to what it takes to stay on top. It takes a lot of cooperation, hard work and focused people to make it work. We have a dedicated coaching staff who want their team members to be students first and athletes second. The student athletes are the ones who make the most of the opportunity presented to them and they are commended for their efforts. The tradition of being successful on the field as well as in the classroom has spread through the entire program."

The seventh straight Smith Cups captured by Salem equals the college's previous number of consecutive "Cups" won. SSC won it each year from 1978 through 1985 and then placed second two years running prior to its current streak. SSC also picked up the Smith Cup crowns in 1973-74 and 1975-76.

The Salem State College Intercollegiate athletic program continued its overall team dominance of the Massachusetts State College Athletic Association (MASCAC) in 1993-94 by capturing the Edward C. Smith Cup - presented annually to the MASCAC institution which compiles the most points based on its final standings in the 14 conference sports - for the seventh straight year.

The top three finishers in the 10 round-robin sports receive six, four and two points respectively. Three, two and one points are awarded for the single day men's and women cross country and track and field championships' top three places. SSC earned the "Cup" for the fourteenth time in the past 16 years and sixteenth time since the "Cup" was first awarded in 1972-73.

"This is an award which is shared by everyone who is connected to the program," said Salem State Athletic Director and MASCAC Commissioner John Galaris. "The student athletes, the coaching staff, the faculty, the administration, the fans, the entire college community. Our commitment to excellence and winning the Smith Cup has become a tradition at Salem State."

SSC teams compiled an overall MASCAC record of 65-8-2 in 1993-94 for an impressive .880 winning percentage. Viking teams won five MASCAC championships in 1993-94 outright, shared two and recorded a pair second place finishes. SSC earned the "Cup" by totalling 45 of a possible 65 points for a 681 percentage. Runner-up Bridgewater tallied 33 of a possible 66 (.500).

This young man has been a two-time All Conference selection. In addition to capturing the Fitchburg State and Gordon College invitational meets, he holds the school record in the 4.4 mile run with a time of 22:37. This year's men's cross country MVP is sophomore David Gagnon from Danvers.
