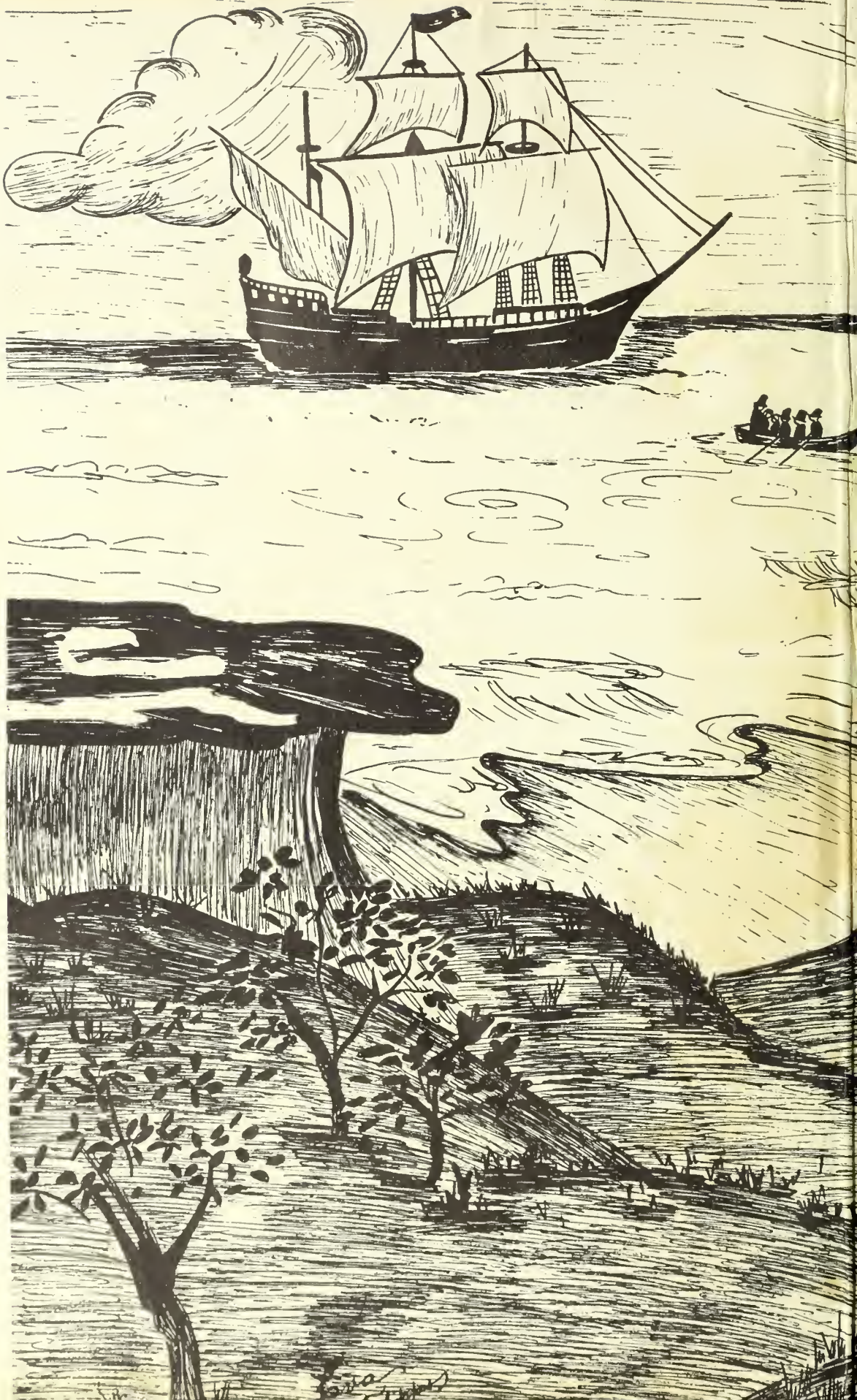

The President's Message

Etymologically, a pilgrim is a wayfarer, and in this sense we are all pilgrims. Life is an adventure upon which we have embarked. The earth where we dwell presents a perpetual challenge to our capacities. We move from one experience to another. We gravitate in various directions. We become alternately introspective and gregarious, deliberate and impulsive, virtuous and gross. It is impossible to escape the inexorable "clutch of circumstance." Our lines are cast in sundry places when destiny throws the dice. No necromancy can chart the future; no miracle can undo the past. Truly we are pilgrims in a very literal interpretation of the word.

Where are we going? This is a perfectly natural question. Even irrational creatures satisfy a purpose. It is idiotic to assert that we are no more than wanderers whose journey is terminated by death. Such a statement implies that man's magnificent faculties were devised for transient ends, and are exercised only in the pursuit of illusory goals. It means that every expenditure of energy, every manifestation of enthusiastic behavior accomplishes no useful result except perhaps the attainment of personal pleasure by the hedonist or the production of a healthier environmental climate by the ascetic. We must recognize the existence of more enduring objectives if we concede the dominion of an omnipotent God.

I have reached an age at which many people begin to realize that the most important thing in life is preparing for death. It is remarkable that very few acknowledge this truth in adolescence, and it is equally amazing that some never accept it at all. We speak glibly of eternity, but to the average person, eternity is a nebulous state to be shared by disembodied spirits in a remote and shadowy hereafter. Reason dictates that we should bring ourselves at an early age to a comprehension of the reality and inevitability of a future life, and identify it — whatever creed we profess — as our ultimate destination.

The Pilgrim Fathers fled from England to escape political, religious, and economic persecution. They established on American soil a colony fashioned according to their own concepts of morality and justice. Not everything they did was defensible. But they were wayfarers with an ideal, adventurers with a will. Their voyage typifies the span between the beginning and the end of life. The landing at Plymouth symbolizes the fulfillment of a dream. They left us a heritage which we would do well to preserve, an example which we might profitably imitate. They were a courageous, persevering, and conscientious people, undaunted by adversity, humble in success. When danger threatened, they invoked God's help; when harvests were plentiful, they gave thanks for His bounty. These very qualities drew them, like a lodestone, to the rock-bound shores of Massachusetts. So shall the motivation of good character steer us safely to port when we, like the Pilgrims, sail beyond the far horizon to a new and happier life.

While I was writing this message, I heard the news of Joseph Stalin's death. As you read these words, it will be almost three months since the ostentatious travesty which the press calls his funeral. For days the inert body of one of the most feared rulers in history lay stretched on a resplendent catafalque, flanked by the trappings of Muscovite pageantry. An interminable procession of faceless millions filed by the gaudy bier in a bizarre tribute to a dead miscreant whom they had virtually deified in life. Stalin was a pilgrim, too. He was like the rest of us in origin and design. The record indicates that his objectives were perfidious and foul. The adulation which marked his passing was in inverse proportion to the quality of his pilgrimage.

Where was he going? Where is he now?

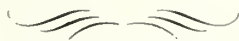

Journal of the Pilgrims of 1953

"And first of the occasion and the indusements ther unto; the which that I may truly unfould, I must begine at the very roote and rise of the same. The which I shall endeavor to manefest in a plaine stile, with singular record unto the simple truth in all things, at least as near as my slender judgmente can attaine the same."

Anno Domini: 1949

September —

12 — Orders were given for immediate embarkation, and we Pilgrims set sail from Freshman Town. Stores, provisions, and everything wanted are in the hold and bills are paid. We have been reviewed by Captain Edward Sullivan, who saw us equipped and marched on board the *Salem*. Sailing with us are four new able navigators: Dr. Leo Hennessey, Mr. Timothy Clifford, Mr. William Rich, and Miss Beulah Sweetser.

During these first hectic weeks, we have become accustomed, with the aid of our more experienced fellow voyagers, to the ways of sea-faring life. The ocean appears calm and the course seems wide and clear. Billets have been assigned and orders given for our manifold duties.

22 — Suddenly the sea has closed in, and the thundercloud Sophomores hover about us. We expect the storm to last about a week, and at every burst of thunder we poor Freshmen become subservient to the will and wiles of the "wise fools," who seize this opportunity to mutiny. Surely, the Indians could have been no worse.

29 — This afternoon, a memorable Thursday, there was one last awful crack of lightning, a torrential burst of water (in the shower room,) and the storm was over. The sun shone again. Tonight, we attended our first social event on shipboard, the Initiation Banquet. There was a record attendance at this affair, because ours is the largest class that has ever embarked. We enjoyed our catered dinner, received and returned song dedications, and revelled in the feeling that we were now really a welcome part of the student body. We readily forgave the Sophomores for their hazing, and they have cemented the goodwill by inviting us to a party in our honor on next Thursday.

October —

In order to insure the safety of our voyage, the ship is being fireproofed. Materials have been brought on board, and the carpenters proceed briskly, from the hold to the top deck. Pat Christoforo will long remember the day she stood watching with awe the process

of painting the stairwells. It took her ten minutes to remove the paint bucket from her head, and two days and a quart of turpentine to get back into "shape" again.

23 —

Our parents and friends braved the treachery of stray beams and unsightly walls when they attended our Freshman Reception this fine Sunday. With Dolores Fillacio as Mistress of Ceremonies, we got our first glimpse of the abundant talent possessed by our crew. Among those performing this afternoon were Ann Gates and Pat Christoforo, George Groesbeck, and Bernie Shaw. Freshman I repeated its successful skit from the Initiation Banquet which was an original musical number. Had every division repeated its skit on this afternoon, we would have seen a radio quiz program by Commercial Freshman II, a pantomime of a relaxing night at a movie presented by Commercial Freshman I, a chorus song dedicated to the Sophomores by Freshman II, and a barbershop quartet composed of members of Freshman III.

28 —

Our mental horizon was broadened during this first year at sea by the lecture programs. Witchcraft returned to Salem in the form of a lecture by hypnotist Lincoln Zonn. With the aid of three of our classmates, Maryann Luz, Carroll Towey, and Arthur Bowen, Mr. Zonn proved his hypnotic powers. One of these people entered into such a deep trance that it caused a good deal of consternation among the audience. Yes, Arthur can vouch for the authenticity of this program. However, no one can vouch for the authenticity of the so-called "Chief Young Thundercloud" who appeared before us on Friday at an unscheduled lecture hour. It was, as was discovered later, a hoax — but the tale of a full-blooded Indian youth working his way through several colleges (both foreign and domestic) was inspiring; the ceremonial tribal dance was interesting, and it must be said the swindle was enjoyed.

November —

We were now well accustomed to the procedures on shipboard, and it was time to elect new officers to direct the business of our group. Jeanne Johnson, later to be Mrs. Kevin Barry, was chosen to be our leader. Assisting President Johnson as vice-presidents were Mildred Shaw and Mrs. Mildred Jutras. Paula Finn was to keep our log, and Jeanne Strange held the post of Treasurer. But all was not business during the first year of our voyage — we had leaders in the realm of extra-curricular activities, too. Among the Freshman contributors to Coach Lowrey's basketball team were Jim Sweeney, Ronnie Lovett, "Deuce" Dawson, Dick St. Amand, Ken Frank, and Joe Giunta. The women capturing basketball honors were Millie Fahey, Louise Hamilton, Connie Somers, Loretta Nowacki, Ginny Finlay, Peggy Scott, and Dolores Fillacio.

Anno Domini: 1950

January —

We have encountered another storm in the form of midyear examinations. We have been told that this was an examination of the reasons and pretenses on which we came here. There were those who treated the voyage on the *Salem* as a pleasure cruise; when we had passed this first severe test of seamanship, we found that they had left our ranks. They were the "casualties" about whom our beloved Captain Sullivan had warned us.

February —

We have swabbed the decks and polished the brass in anxious anticipation of the arrival of inspection officers, the accreditation committee of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.

9 —

This morning the accreditation committee drew up alongside and came aboard. They have spent the day checking to see how we measure up to the high standards set by their organization. One incident is worthy of remark. At the close of a history class, one of the visitors who had been observing the class remarked that it had been an interesting hour. Chet Zwonik expressed the general sentiment by replying, "All our history classes are interesting!" Such spirit must have made a good impression.

March —

20 —

The *Salem* has become an accredited member of the A.A.C.T.E. A banquet was held in Chapel Hall to commemorate this occasion. In appreciation of his leadership and tireless efforts toward the goal we had attained, the Cooperative Association presented Captain Sullivan with a beautiful mahogany desk. Now that we had earned our accreditation, we must strive to uphold the standards of our alma mater.

April —

28 —

This day we sponsored our first social event. Our Freshman Dance was called "Spring Fever" — we had a sure cure in pretty girls, handsome men, and dreamy music. We unanimously acclaimed the choice of Pat Cahill as "Sweetheart" of our dance.

June —

The storm of another exam period was quelled by the thought of an extended vacation. We "moved up" for the first time and watched with distant anticipation the activities of our future commencement. We had a long journey, but we knew what our

destination was to be. We proudly acclaimed the fact that we had reached our first port safely and were anchored in Sophomore Harbor for the summer.

September —

Reviewed again, equipped, and sent to receive stores. With good hopes we have put to sea again on the second stage of our journey. The lively meetings of this Sophomore year are getting under way, presided over by Dick St. Amand, with Pat Cahill second in command, Dolores Fillacio keeping the log, and Elaine Hammerstrom guarding the treasure chest.

20 —

Initiation Week is upon us, but now we see it through different eyes. Pat Cahill, Initiation chairman, will not let us lose our heads, or, rather, she will not let the Freshmen lose theirs. The banquet ends our active participation in this give-and-take cycle of our voyage.

October —

Bob Tivnan brought distinction to us by scoring 102 out of a possible 105 points on the annual *Time* Magazine Current Events Quiz, and Commercial Sophomore I honored us by winning a silver cup in a nationwide shorthand contest. It was decided that the cup would be left with Miss Witham, the instructor of the class.

November —

No journey is completely safe without provision for illness or accident. We were well insured with our first-aid courses. The sight of five or six people skillfully bandaged from head to toe was oddity in those days — and there were those ever-so-fortunate bantamweights who *always* got the rides in the "stretchers."

December —

6 —

Upon invitation, several members of the State Legislature visited the *Salem* on this day. The purpose of this visit was to acquaint the Senators and Representatives of the Commonwealth with our students, procedures, and needs. Since we are a state-supported institution, it is evident that there should be a close and harmonious relationship between our government officials and ourselves in order to attain the aim exemplified in our motto, *Progredi!*



Anno Domini: 1951

January —

19 — We weathered the midyears like experienced seafarers and returned as second-semester Sophomores with the prospect of putting on our Sophomore Show.

March —

27 — We chose Emily Shannon to direct our first attempt behind the footlights — and we could have chosen no better, for "Hysterical Revue" was a tremendous success. The theme of our show was that of historical events expressed in song. We might have called it "Historical Revue," but after the first few rehearsals it was decided that "Hysterical" was definitely more suitable. We shall never forget Fran FitzGerald and Loretta Nowacki as Adam and Eve, Paul Riley and Lanny Spinale as Antony and Cleopatra, Mary Wilton as John Smith, and Emily Shannon as Miss Liberty. Ann Gates and Pat Christoforo were our choreographers. Proof of their excellent training was shown in the "stepping" of Jack Marr, John Andreadis, and Dick Mackie.

April —

Our Sophomore Dance was another successful venture. We brought Cupid to life amid the hearts and flowers gaily adorning the walls of Chapel Hall. As has been true of all our social events, a capacity crowd was in attendance.

May —

30 — "To err is human." Everyone makes mistakes. We were both saddened and delighted with the news of Mrs. King's retirement — saddened because we were losing a helpful friend and guide and delighted because she was to become Mrs. Edward A. Sullivan and stand at his side as our official hostess.

Hoisted the Junior colors and saluted them. Before we take up the full responsibilities of actual training duties as advanced seamen we are to enjoy a summer cruise through the Pleasure Islands.

October —

November —

22 — At the W.A.A. Banquet, Louise Hamilton received her fourth award, an honor seldom bestowed upon a Junior.

June —

1 — Our Elementary and Junior High divisions have completed their first training period. We now know what it is to ride in a raft alongside the *Salem*. The crew of the sturdy vessel has equipped us with the knowledge of handling the tiller of our own small craft — application is another thing.

"So, their time limited them being expired, they returned to the ship, least they should be in fear of their saftie; and took with them part of the corne . . . and so like the men of Escholl carried with them of the fruits of the land and showed their breethren; of which and their return, they were marvelusly glad and their harts encouraged."

The Army beckoned to George Betses, Jim Neenan, and Lennie Wall during the summer months, and we sincerely wish good luck to these three members of the Business Education Department whose presence we miss throughout our Senior year. Had these boys been able to stay with us, Lennie would have been President of the M.A.A. and Jim, Treasurer. George would have been President of Kappa Delta Phi.

October —

The officers of our Yearbook have been elected and plans are being made for the annual CLIPPER Dance in Chapel Hall. The decorations committee combined the theme of the dance with the season, and original and colorful setting was the result.

24 — A record number was in attendance as usual, and the event proved a tremendous success socially and financially. Our Yearbook is on its way.

31 — Norman Burns is being acclaimed as a hero, because he is the first Senior to give a Chapel speech. Through the halls resound the echoes of the classical poems being given in Speech class. “Barbara Frietchie” has become a byword, and the “Schooner Hesperus” is wrecked daily.

November —

The duties of a new office, that of Dean of the College, have been assumed by Dr. Helen J. Keily of the Business Education Department. One of the first tasks ahead of Dean Keily was the formation of an Accreditation Committee, composed of faculty and students, which readied the *Salem* for revisitation by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. The day after Thanksgiving, on the 28th of this month, all hands were on deck for a general swabbing and polishing of the ship, under the direction of Dr. James Sullivan. Students and faculty brought their own brooms and other implements and put them to good use.

December —

3-4-5 — Representing the A.A.C.T.E., Dr. Forrest A. Irwin, President of the State Teachers College at Jersey City, New Jersey, and Dr. J. Eugene Smith, President of the State Teachers College at Willimantic, Connecticut, spent three days on board, visiting rooms, and interviewing seamen and officers, and receiving reports of our committees. Anno Domini: 1953

January —

9 — As cold as ever I had felt it all winter. Blizzard raging and those who had wandered from the ship were unable to return all day. Fears arise that this lost time must be made up later.

23 — Midyear exams are over and we have attended the W.A.A. Semi-Formal, "Here in Hawaii." President Sullivan slipped the lei over Dolores Fillacio's head proclaiming her Queen and complimenting her Senior attendants, Louise Hamilton and Ann Gates.

31 — The Elementary, Junior High, and Commercial Seniors have at long last completed their practice-teaching requirements after countless trials and tribulations. On this day the Pilgrims of 1953 are united and attending classes at the college for the first time since January, 1952.

April —

2 — At Chapel exercises, Captain Sullivan reported to us the findings of the committee from the A.A.C.T.E. Our rating was high, we were happy to know, and the *Salem* remains on the accredited list. We and later voyagers must keep it high on the list.

8 — Members of Miss Burnham's Shakespeare elective group will long remember the shore leave at the Colonial Theatre in Boston, "An Evening with Will Shakespeare" (only it was an afternoon). The performance included scenes from the comedies, histories, and tragedies. Early in the performance, we Salemites blushed with shame at the rudeness of some of our Boston neighbors, but the awkward situation was handled effectively and tactfully by Margaret Webster, the director. Seldom does one have the opportunity to find one program featuring six stars: Eva Le Gallienne, Basil Rathbone, Faye Emerson, John Lund, Viveca Lindfors, and Margaret Webster.

30 — How fine we look in our new outfits, the academic caps and gowns. Investiture, the first of the series of shipboard activities as we near the end of our journey, has just taken place.

May —

In this month two annual events, the Commercial Council and W.A.A. Banquets are held, with the usual good fellowship and cheer prevailing.

May 28 to June 8 —

In rapid succession came the dedication of the CLIPPER, final exams, Alumni Reunion, Baccalaureate, Last Chapel, Move-Up, Ivy Exercises, Senior Luncheon, Tea, and Reception. All these are festivities which are in connection with the end of the voyage.

June —

9 — Weighed anchor in Commencement Bay, the finest in the Province, the haven toward which our compass was set four years ago.
