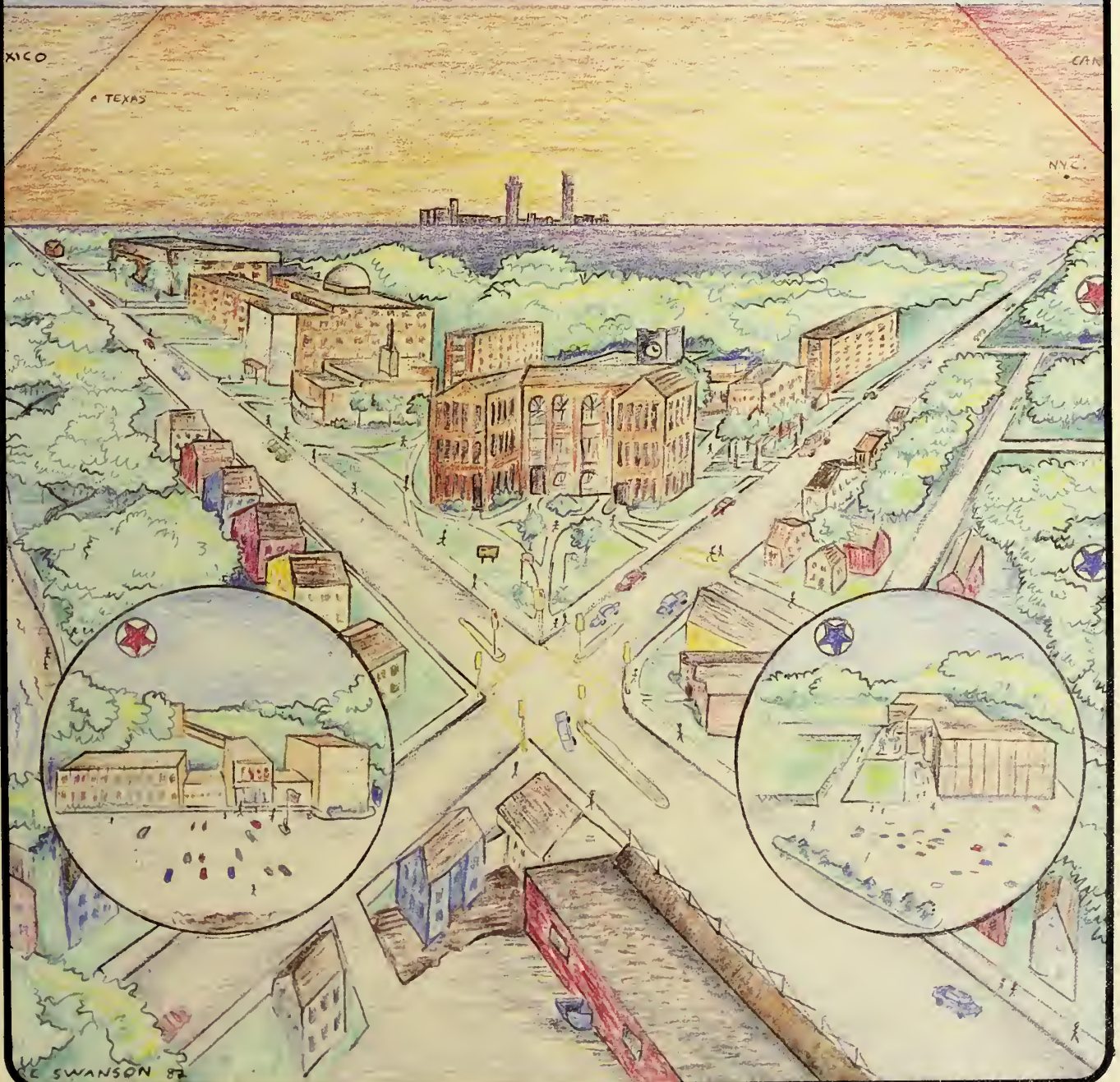

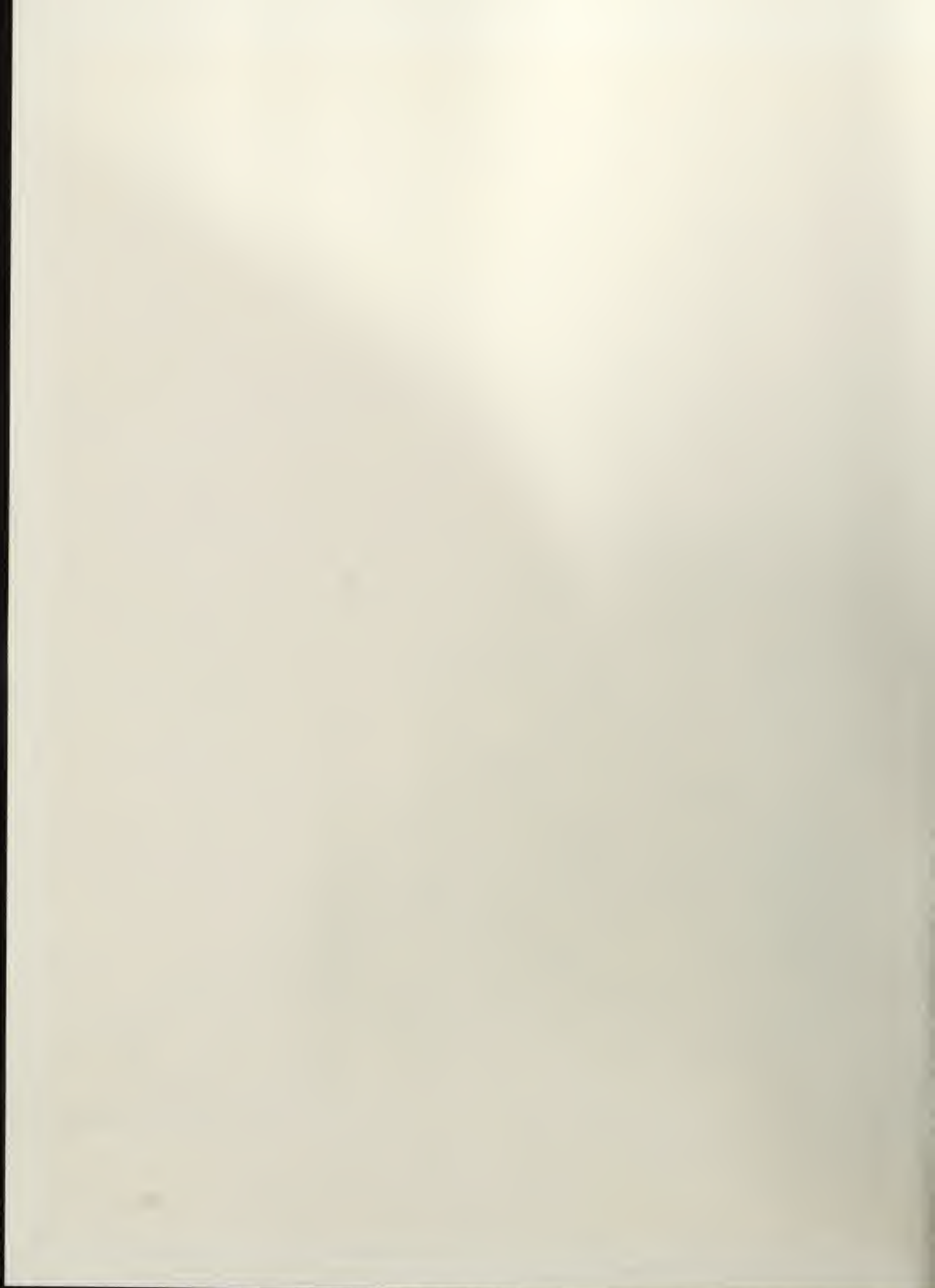

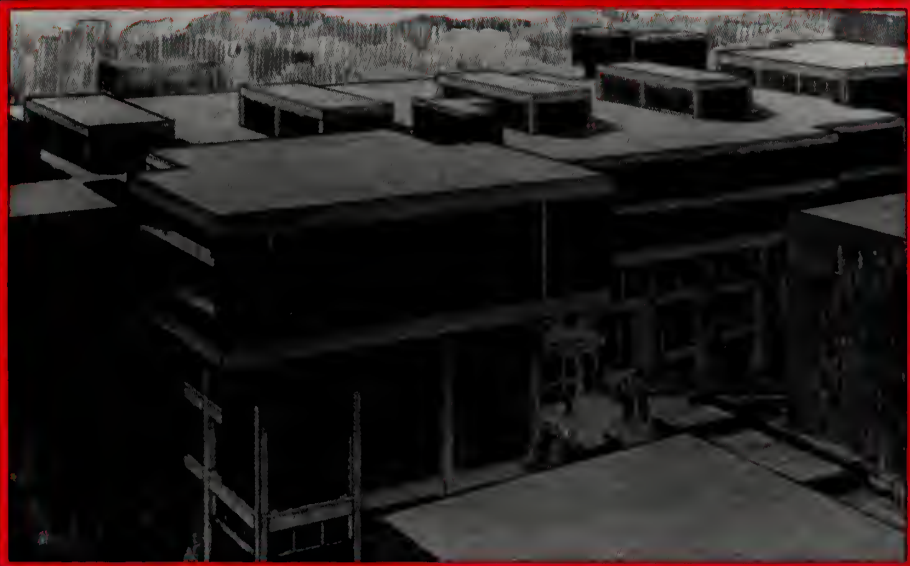
Salem State College as we now know it has grown a great deal in its 128 year history. It first opened in 1854 as the State Normal School at Salem in the Old Registry of Deeds at the corner of Broad Street and Summer Street.

In 1896 the school moved to its present address, consisting of one building then known as the Academic Building.

In 1913 the Training School was built and in 1935 it was renamed the Horace Mann Training School.

At this time, building was halted and all attention was focused on the academic and extra-curricular activities of the students.





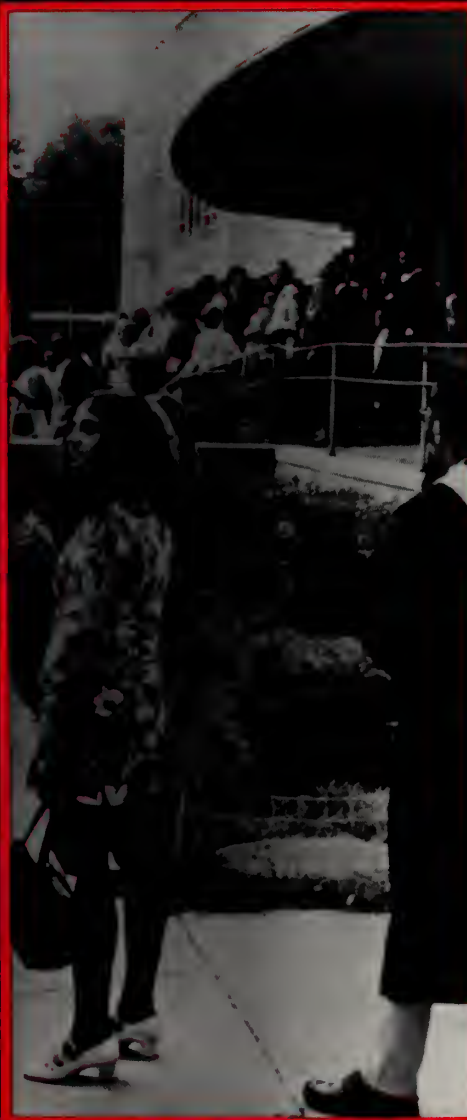
In 1932 the formal name of the college was changed to State Teachers College at Salem and remained relatively unchanged until 1954. At this time the name of the college was again changed to State College at Salem and in 1955 the campus began to take the shape of its present stature. In this year, a multi-purpose structure was built, housing administrative offices, a cafeteria, an auditorium, a library and a gym.

In 1964 the Business Education Arts and Science Building was erected and in 1966 the two dormitories, the Student Union and the Bell Tower were added to the campus. In 1969 the Academic Building was dedicated to Edward A. Sullivan and thus renamed.



During the early seventies the college acquired many buildings including South Campus, which opened in 1973, along with the Alumni House, the Presidents home and the Education House. In 1974 the library was added to the Main Campus and the final architectural addition was added in 1976. This culminated in the opening of the O'Keefe Sports Complex. In 1977 the Business Education Arts and Science Building was dedicated to Frederick A. Meier.

Within the time we have been here, we have seen the beautification of the college grounds and have realized its potential for growth.



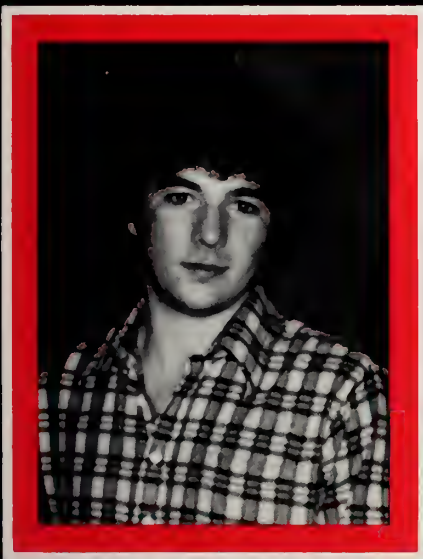
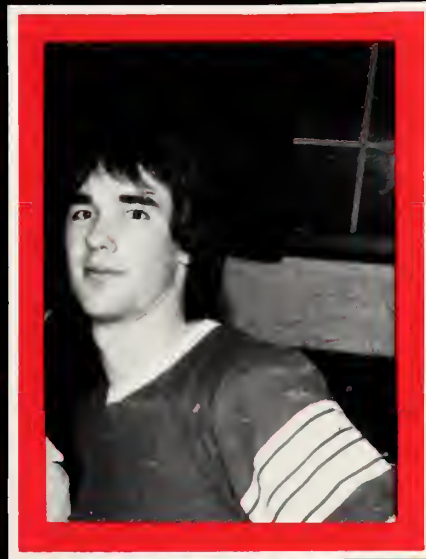

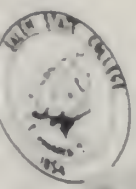


SENIOR REMEMBERANCE

JUST ANOTHER BUZZ OF THE ALARM





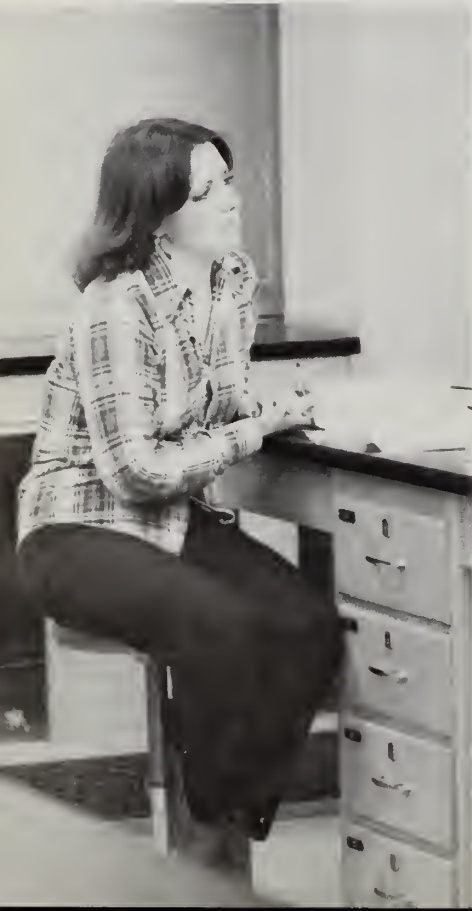
... and my arm flew out to silence the alarm. I craved the thought of staying in bed. Just 10 more luxurious minutes in bed.

SHARING LIFE BETWEEN THIN WALLS . . .





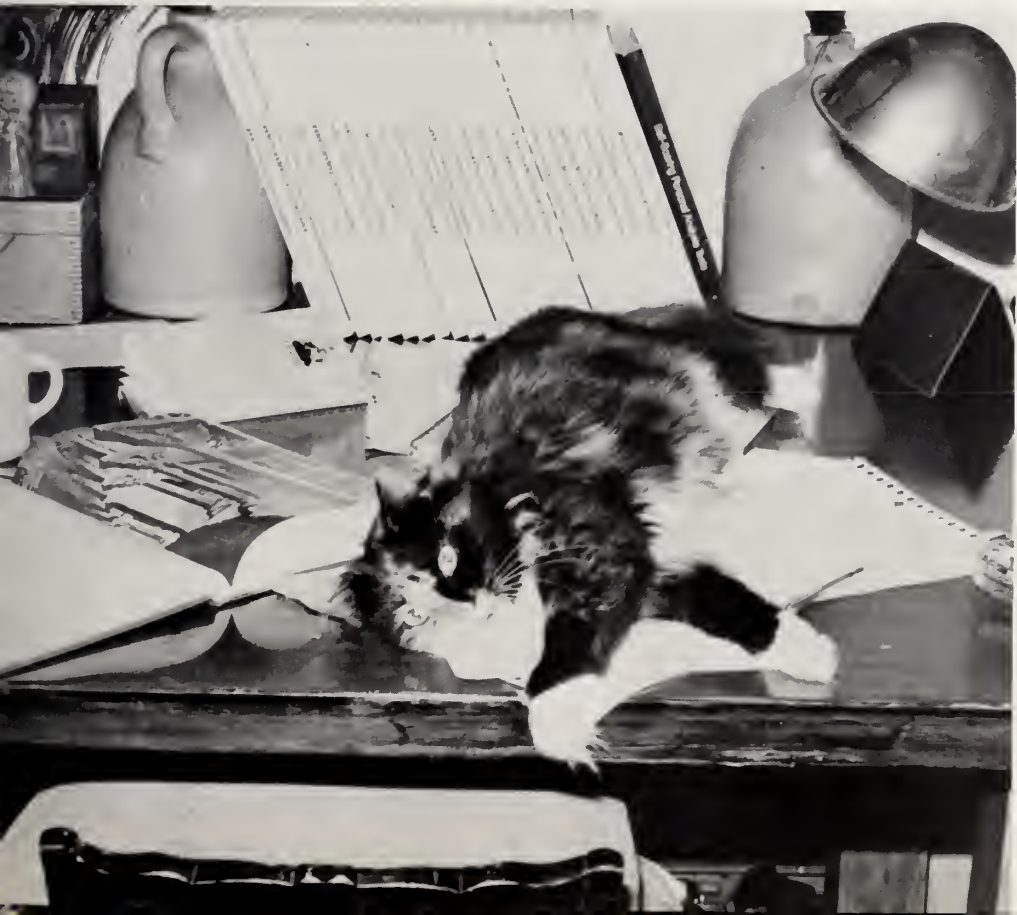

The Uniform: A major problem for the Nursing student. Discussions usually center around a few direct questions, Does it fit? Is it clean? Did it shrink?

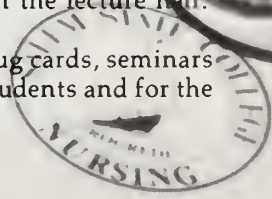

On the basis of NCAA participation and outside recognition, the 1981-82 basketball season was one of the most successful ever at Salem State. The team won its third straight Mass. State College Athletic Conference title and hosted its first-ever NCAA Division III Northeast Regional Tournament, losing in the finals. The 20-8 final record represented the second straight year SSC had won 20 or more games. Also highlighting the season was a 10 game win streak that sealed the MASCAC title and the championship of the Pepsi Invitational against two Division II teams at Merrimack College in December.

Helen Watson Felt

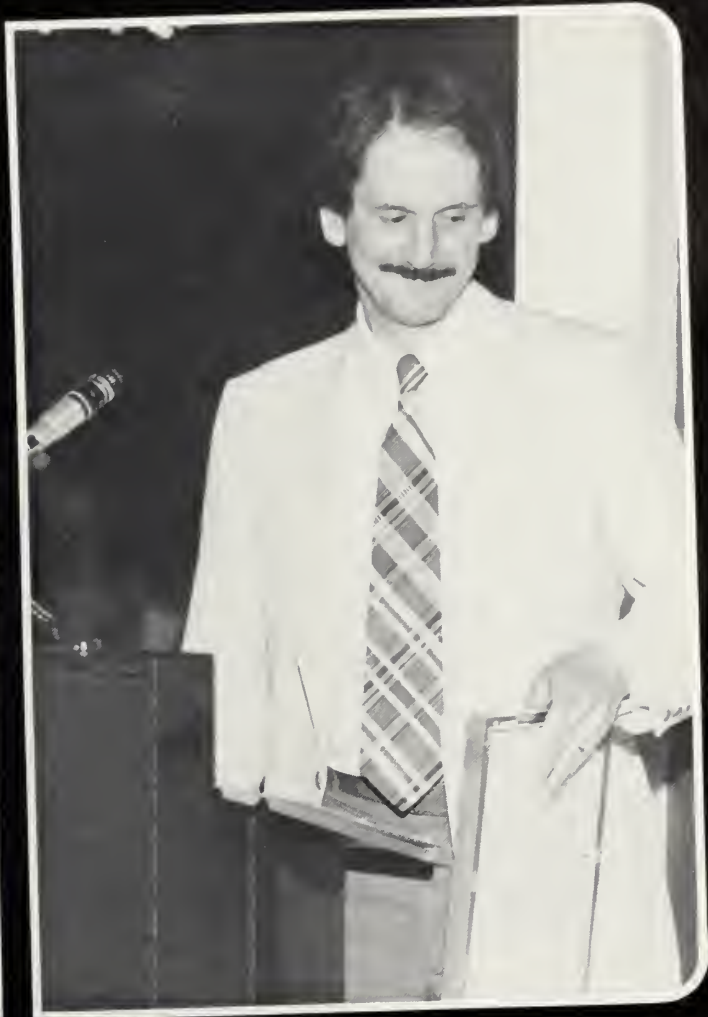

Helen, thank you for giving so much of yourself to all of us.





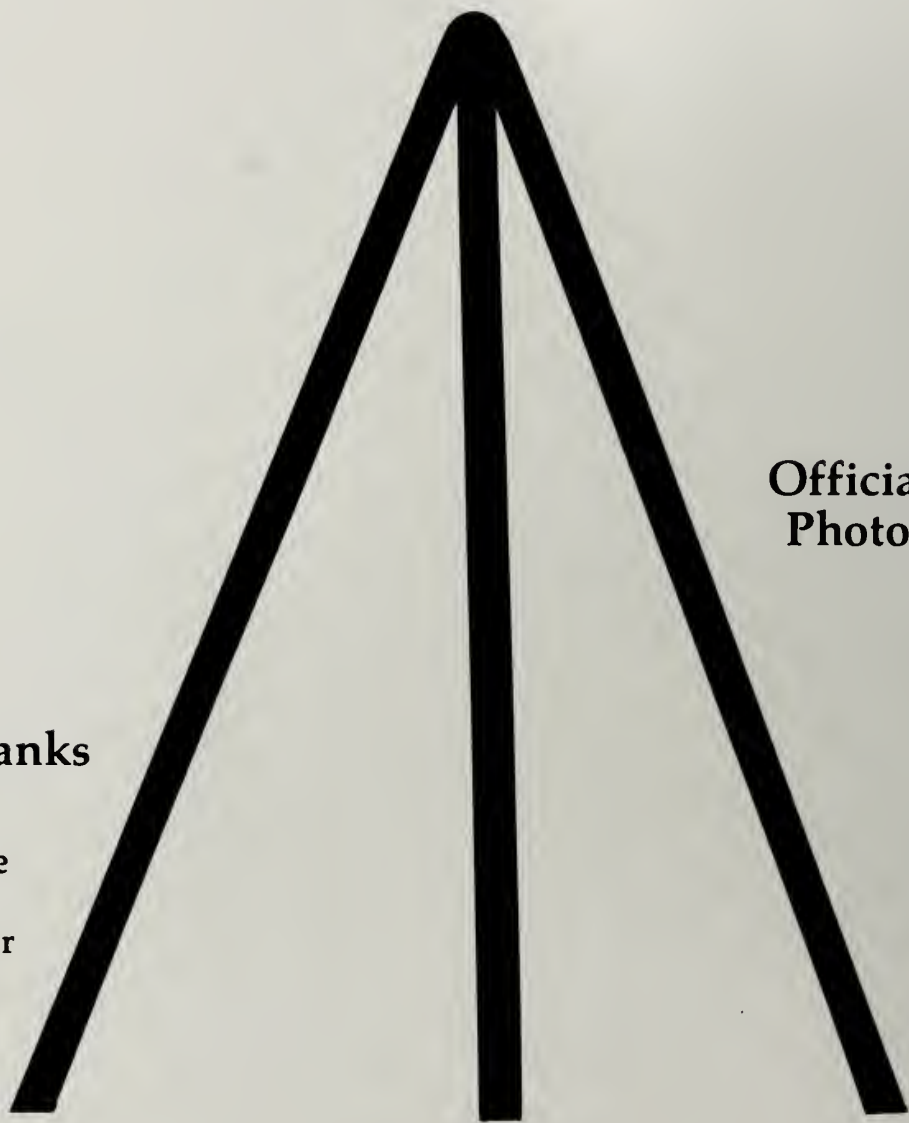
Dr. Robert Caruso
