the globe a hundred times.

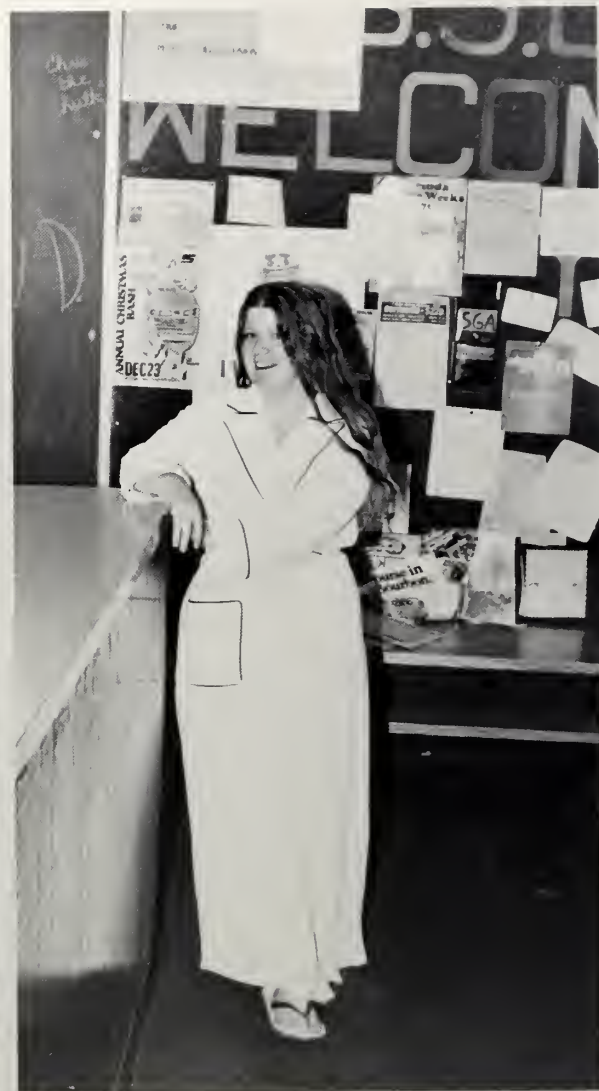

Athletic Training

What Is Athletic Training?

Athletic Training involves helping the athlete condition him or herself for regular season play, he diagnoses injuries and provides treatment and rehabilitation of those injuries.

Bill Bulloch is the man who takes care of Salem State's athletes. Bill, a certified Athletic Trainer, came to Salem State almost three years ago. He was the Trainer at Bridgewater State College for two years previous to coming here.

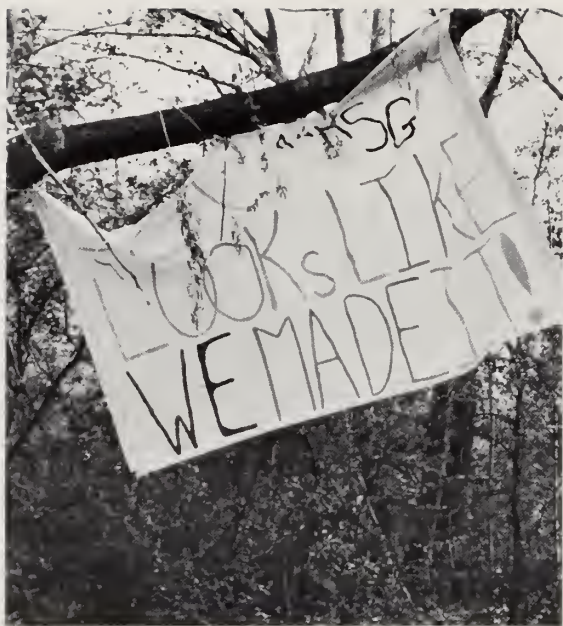
The year 78-79 was one of trial and triumph for WMWM. To begin with the station didn't open until Friday October 13, which had been a bad omen because within two months WMWM ran without management until February, when Shannon Maguire and Harry LeBlanc were elected to the positions of General Manager and Station Manager respectively. Also at this time, the position of Technical Advisor was filled by one of the faculty members Will Katzen. However, Mr. Katzen resigned after one month on board. The next candidate declined the job for financial reasons. Things looked pretty gloomy for the radio station. To make matters more complicated, the Federal Communications Commission ruled that all ten watt stations must increase their power to a minimum of 100 watts and operate at least 12 hours per day every day of the year by January 1, 1980, or face costly frequency search and possible change or shut down.

The first step on the road to recovery was twofold. First they had the good fortune to secure the services of an excellent engineer who began by transforming the signal from mono to stereo. Secondly the new management and staff gained the support of the S.G.A. So in March the S.G.A. agreed to fund the executive staff's trip to Washington D.C. to attend a convention of collegiate broadcasters. The new staff brought back new ideas and a better understanding of the mechanics of how to run a radio station.

Now came the challenge for WMWM. They had to purchase a new transmitter and install it before the end of 1979. The biggest problem was how to pay for this new piece of equipment. First there was a week of 24 hour broadcasting, a D.J. marathon. Over \$800.00 was pledged but sadly less than a tenth of that was collected. As time ran out the last hope was a grant from the Book Store Trust Fund. Members of the committee to review the requests were not too optimistic that WMWM would be funded at least not for the amount they had requested. The managers worked hard and came up with a presentation that could not be denied (which among other things included a recommendation from the mayor of Salem.) The staff showed en masse as a display of solidarity. Emotions were running high.

The final results took place on July 7th when a new higher power transmitter was put in place on the Meier Building. It was a long trying year for the members of the radio station, but they came out on top. And they have just begun.

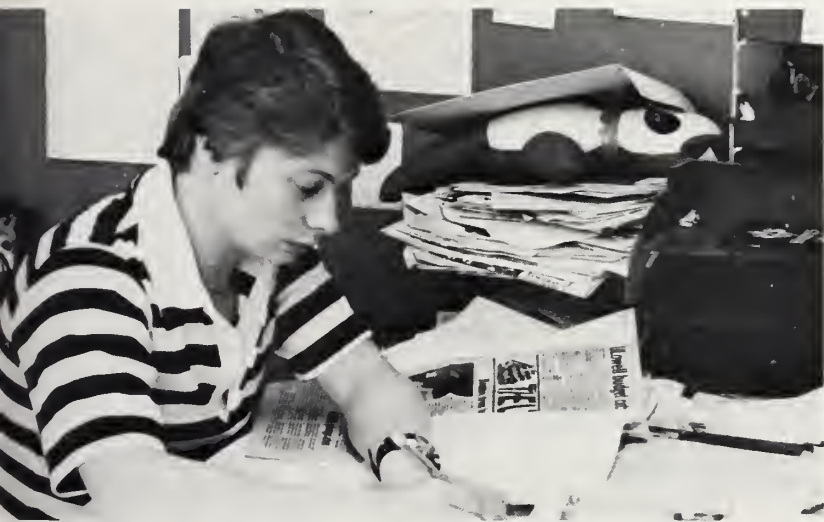


Campus Christian Fellowship

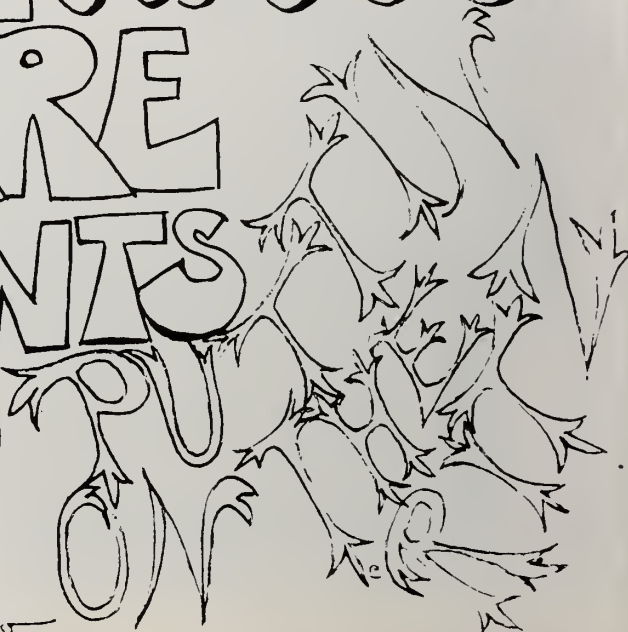

FRANCIS E. CALLAN RETIRES

Associate Professor Francis E. Callan of the Department of Theatre and Speech Communication at Salem State College will retire at the end of this academic year after twenty-five years of service to the Commonwealth.

Professor Callan was born in Brockton and graduated from Brockton schools, where he first became interested in the theatre. As a member of the Brockton Little Theatre, he received his first training in directing and acting. In 1936 he entered Bridgewater State, from which he graduated in 1940 with Honors in Drama. He was the narrator for the spectacular Centennial Pageant at Bridgewater State College. During World War II, he wrote a number of plays which were presented by public service groups for purchase of war bonds.

In 1950, he moved to New Hampshire, where he worked in the State Library and served as consultant for the New Hampshire Department of Education. While in Concord, he became active in the Concord Community Players, acting in and directing a number of dramatic presentations.

Professor Callan came to Salem State College in 1954, working in the library and teaching in the English Department under Miss Gertrude Burnham. He also produced plays in collaboration with Miss Marion Marshall. Together they revived *The Footlighters*, presenting such plays as *The Glass Menagerie* and *Gaslight*. In 1960, Miss Hoff, head of the Speech Department, retired and President Meier asked Mr. Callan to take over the chairmanship of that department. At the same time, Miss Marshall requested that he serve as advisor to *The Footlighters*. Also, Dr. James Sullivan, Dean of Studies, asked Mr. Callan to introduce some courses in Theatre, the first of which, "Introduction to Theatre Arts," was offered in 1961.

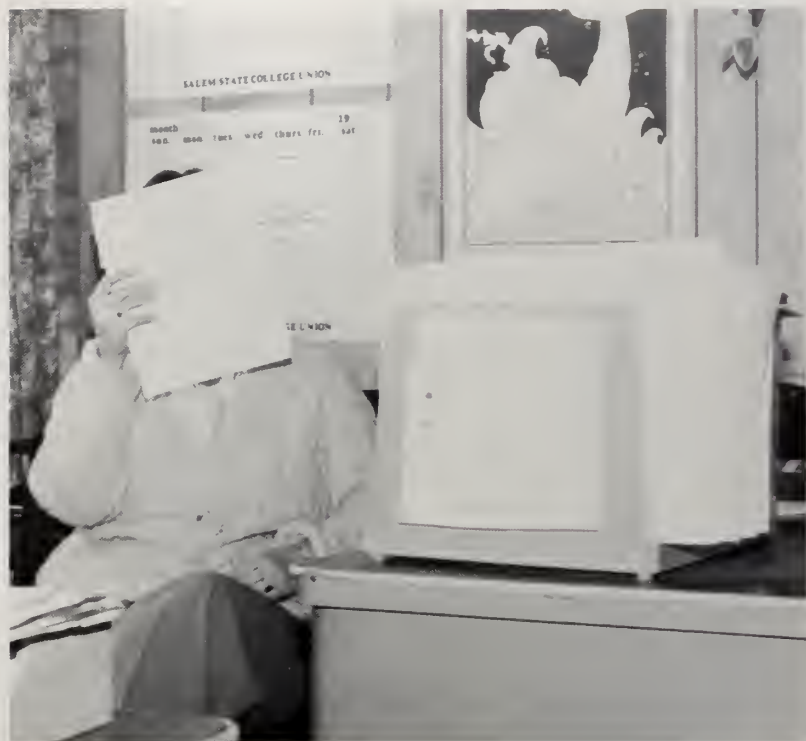
From then on, the drama became an integral part of Salem State College, with such classical and contemporary offerings as *The Father* by Strindberg, *Hedda Gabler* by Ibsen, *Tartuffe* and *Physician In Spite of Himself* by Moliere, as well as *The Crucible*, *See How They run*, *Night Must Fall*, *The Tender Trap* and *Waiting for Godot*.

The Theatre and Speech Communication Department has grown from one faculty member to twelve and now offers a program leading to a Bachelor's Degree in Theatre Arts. The department also boasts of two theatre - The Main Stage Auditorium and The Callan Studio Theatre, which is designed for the presentation of experimental drama and student produced plays.

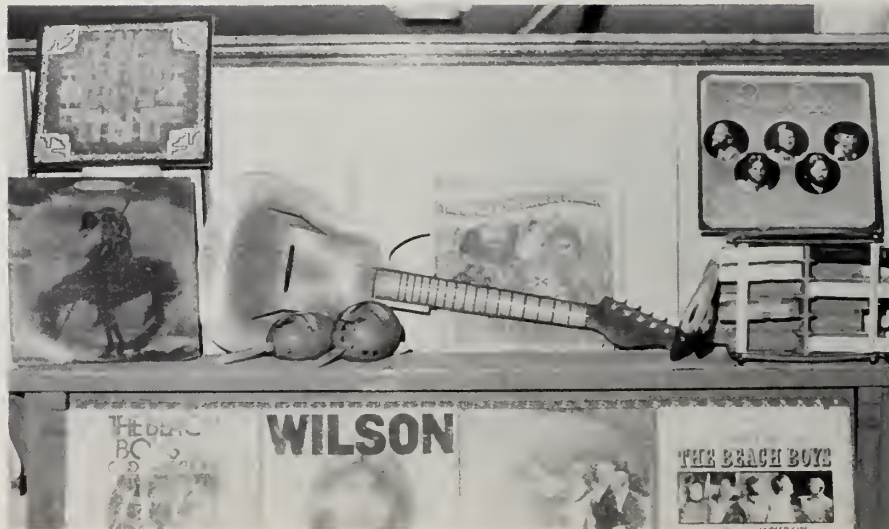
Professor Callan received his formal training in the drama from various institutions, such as The Leland Powers School of Theatre, The University of Arizona at Tucson, Northern Illinois University at De Kalb, New York University of New York at Washington Square, Columbia University, and Boston University. He is a member of the NEA, and the New England Theatre Conference.

Professor Callan's invaluable contributions to the field of Theatre and Speech at Salem State and to the college community as a whole will be long remembered by his many friends and colleagues.

The Salem State Viking golf team, led by medalists Paul Littlejohn and Bill Lynch, defeated 18 other Massachusetts schools in winning the fifth annual Massachusetts Intercollegiate Golf Tournament on Thursday, April 19, at Stow Acres Country Club. The Vikings, who entered the match with a record of 6 wins and 1 loss, dominated the field, beating second place Amherst College by six strokes. They defeated the third place teams, Southeastern Mass and Babson, by ten strokes, nineteenth place Worcester State was demolished by 79 strokes.

In compiling their score of 319, the Vikings had 2 golfers tied with top scores of 77, Paul Littlejohn and Bill Lynch. These two shared Medalist Honors with two other golfers, Mike Blase of Amherst and Babson's Stephen Keegan. The remaining Viking scores were: Chuck Tryder with an 82, Steve Hogan with 83, and Wayne Anders, 89.'

On April 17, the Vikings warmed up for the intercollegiate tourney by defeating Merrimack, 396-424. Bill Lynch and Paul Littlejohn led the way, each netting a score of 77. Chuck Tryder followed

with a 78, and he was followed by Wayne Anders (82), Joe Vaughan (82), Jack Morrison (83), and Steve Hogan (84).

Salem ran their record to 7 - 1 on April 20 by edging Providence College 388-390. Steve Hogan and Jack Morrison were high scorers for the Vikings, each having a 76. Paul Littlejohn followed with a 77 and Bill Lynch had a 79. Chuck Tryder had an to give the Vikings a 388 total. Alan Ryding led Providence with a 76.

Mathematics Professor Thomas Lathrop died of cancer November 27, 1978. He had been teaching at Salem State College for sixteen years.

He was an active member of The National Teachers Council of Mathematics, Salem Citizens Council of Public Schools, and Kappa Mu Epsilon.

Throughout his career he was awarded many degrees. He also wrote several books dealing with the topic of mathematics. Too he served in the U.S. Army, taught at various colleges across the country, and was a member of assorted associations at Salem State College.

Assistant Professor of the Business Administration Department at Salem State College died February 21, 1979. He was a faculty member since 1968. He was involved in a number of college committees including the Faculty Senate Executive Board, Chairperson of the Business Administration Departmental Screening Committee. He had received his Masters in Business from Babson Institute. Also he had earned his Doctorate on January 25, 1979 from Boston University.

History Professor Robert Scott died of cancer during the summer of 1978. Professor Scott had been a faculty member of Salem State College for almost a decade.

Professor Scott was religiously involved in Political issues. He was a pastor of The United Church of Christ Congregational of Burlington and The Congregation of Weston. He also served in the U. S. Navy. In addition, Professor Scott had received various degrees and was a Doctoral Candidate. He belonged to various organizations of Massachusetts. Professor Scott made valuable contributions of knowledge to Salem State College and is remembered.

Professor Fox has led the fight to do away with required attendance, supported the students rights to be at the bargaining table, and students rights to evaluate faculty.

He has advised and counseled students, instituted new and innovative programs with the Academic Department.
