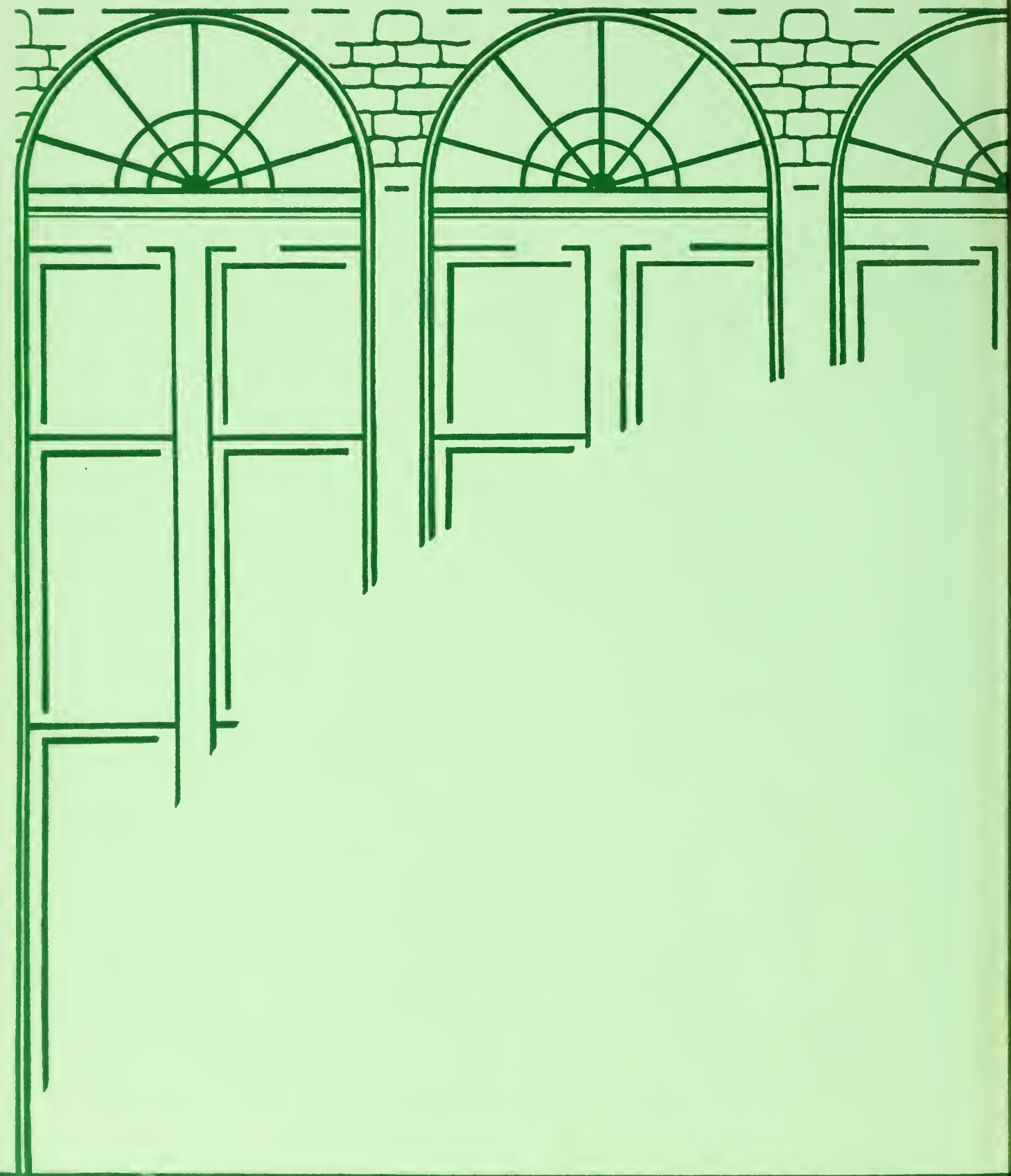
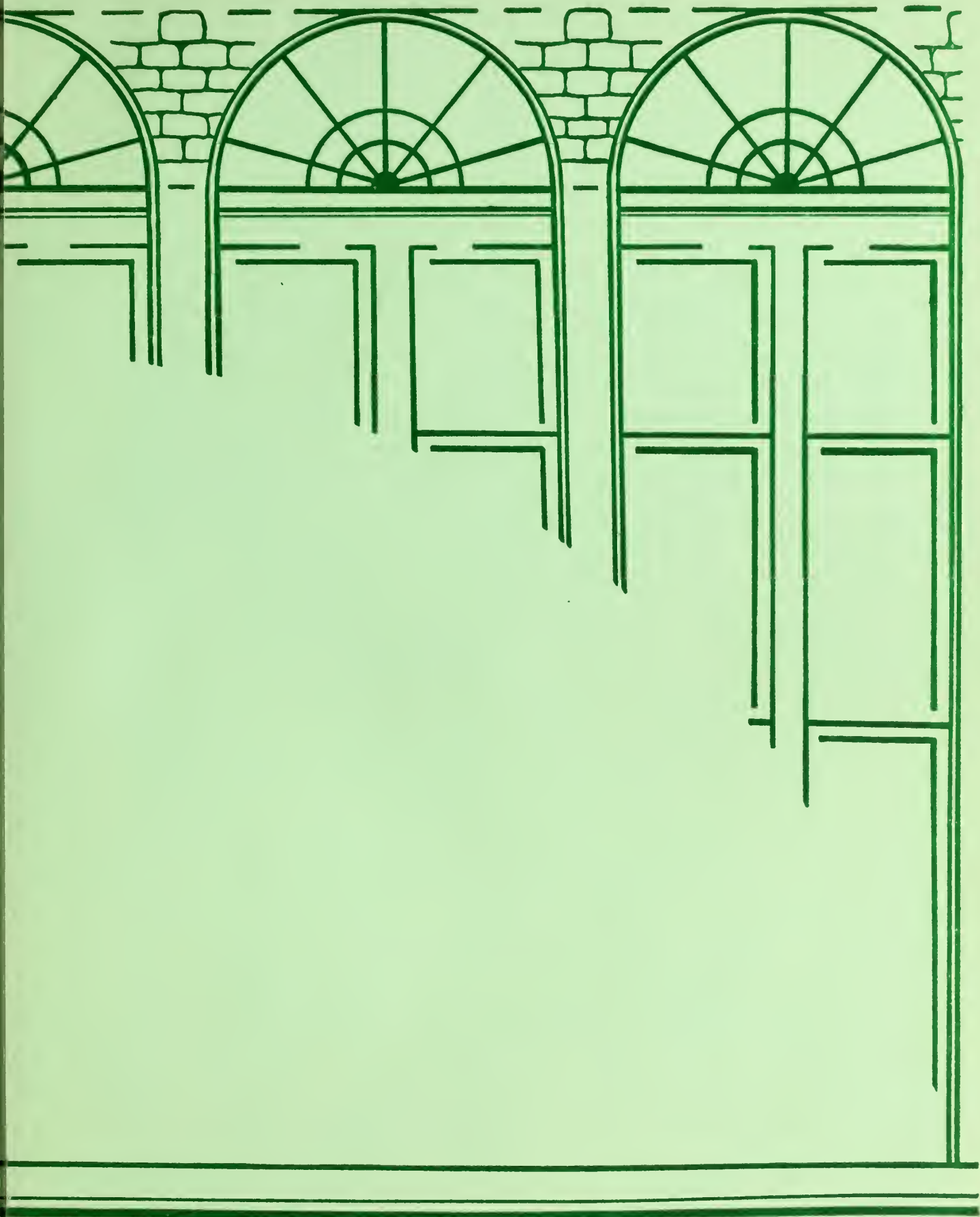

The President's Message

The optimist believes that reality is essentially good. He sees life as a glorious adventure full of thrilling experiences and the pursuit of exciting ideals. Disappointment, defeat, frustration and kindred reverses are to him only stimuli toward the realization of happiness and the accomplishment of worthwhile things.

The pessimist is a misanthrope whose world holds nothing but a vast potpourri of shattered illusions and broken dreams. He subscribes with Schopenhauer to the monstrous teaching that misery and failure are the natural state of man. To him the past offers no inspiration; the future, no hope.

Somewhere between these divergent philosophies lies the true perspective. Life is not exclusively either joyful or sorrowful. It is a medley of many tunes. That man gets most out of life who successfully harmonizes the greatest number of notes. Most of us have difficulty in attaining this objective because discouragements usually multiply with the passing years. Youth is a time of brave ambition and high resolve. Maturity is a test of courage and will. Too many of us go down into the shadows and have not strength enough to dissipate the enveloping gloom.

The garlands belong to those who find the sun. Tennyson expressed this truth perfectly when he wrote:

"I hold it truth with him who sings
To one clear harp in diverse tones
That men may rise on stepping stones
Of their dead selves to higher things."

You seniors stand at the portcullis of life. Behind you are roads which have been not too torturous. You have come a long way with comparatively few unpleasant experiences. Possibly your troubles have been magnified for a time, but the buoyancy of youth has served you in good stead to preserve optimism and intensify faith. Before you lurk your enemies. They are the same implacable foes whom we all have to fight. They are fully armed and they know no fear. Bunyan tells about them in "Pilgrim's Progress". They have been campaigning for centuries behind the same red moat.

This is not a professional exhortation. We are not concerned so much with your success as teachers—we are interested in your success as men and women. Despite a popular misconception, nearly all of our graduates eventually find their niche and build auspiciously on the foundations laid in the classrooms at Salem. I hope we may be able to say in the years to come that you have been good warriors too, that you have fought with the tenacity which characterized your earlier struggles, that you have never lost sight of the standard-bearer in the vanguard—that you have marched in a solid phalanx to the victory of our dreams.

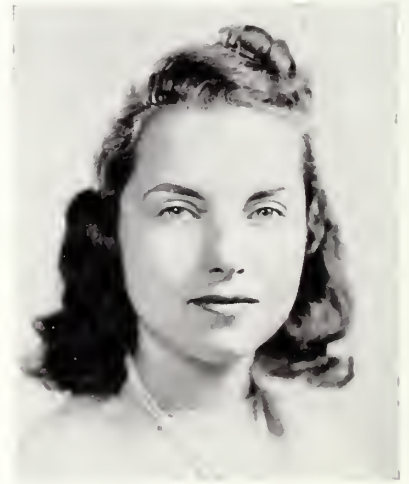

Commercial History

Off for a new adventure!

Anticipating a thrill-packed voyage, forty-five potential navigators on the seas of commercial pedagogy climbed aboard the training cruiser STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE, anchored at the famous port of Salem, Massachusetts. Recruiting officers all over the State had examined these candidates and had recommended that they be allowed to receive active training duty. This happened in September 1936.

And, as it is recorded in the deck-log, these young hopefuls were greeted by first class petty officers who were to help in orientation. The novices were informed as to what was expected by the line and deck officers and the captain of the ship; they were told that if assignments were carried out from day to day there would be no difficulty in traveling up the ladder to ensign. They learned that each semester would mean an increase in rating. At the end of the first semester they would become seamen third class; the end of the first year would find them seamen second class, and so on until the final increase would lead to a commission as ensign.

In chapel, where these initiates were to learn of many things which cannot be put in words, ideas which would be appreciated later, the voyage was officially begun by a welcome by the captain of the ship. The ropes were cast off. The voyage had begun!

The initial test, aside from the I. Q. examination, was the much dreaded and much talked about initiation. Other than a few minor contusions and abrasions and a few mental upsets, no serious cases were treated as the sick bay. The freshman party, however, helped even up matters.

Soon the routine of answering the roll call, the reporting to the officers of the work done, the occasional shore leave and the sudden squalls and storms (examinations) became part of the day's log. Many of this group of aspirants now found that other specialty fields could be explored. Sports, dramatics, journalism, debating, and a wealth of other groups catered to the abilities of the individual.

Outstanding events during the cruise of that year were the Christmas party, with all the fixings, the trip to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and the history "answer key," that pamphlet which represented so much frantic and hectic (to say nothing of hectographic) worry and work.

As the season ended the tyros found that they knew how to locate a spot if the angle of the sun, the time of the day and the direction of the shadow were given; they understood the meanings of the "gay" and "kay" hooks (no, not anchors), the fundamentals of psychology, the workings and operation of a "mill" (typewriter), and the secrets of science, accounting, and English themes.

But, now we note, as we peruse the ship's log, that the Captain was to retire. Over thirty years of service! A worthy example for the young gobs; and they, conscious of the great work well done, joined with their superiors in bidding farewell.

At the same time, it was farewell to the ship; the summer shore leave was given. And they were now full-fledged seamen second class.

SEPTEMBER 1937

The beginning of the second year! A new captain; a well-trained leader and veteran, in truth, of battles and storms. Shove off!

A year crammed with new and more difficult mooring board problems. Learning how to sell cans of salmon, gloves, hats and suits; working the mills while decoding the cryptic markings taken under fire; discovering the difference between spring and winter wheat; reading history the better to see the future; understanding more about the guidance of those who are to be led and guided when the commission of ensign is conferred—all this happened during the passage.

Furthermore, it was recorded, there was an initiation—this time the newcomers suffered. A new officer in charge of athletics arrived, a Christmas party was held, some went ashore to work during the Christmas shore leave, an inspection was made of Charles River basin, and other points of interest in Boston Harbor. There were a circus and a geography exhibit of New England. It was during this year that the captain's list was established.

And the storms of January and June were met. In January, our voyagers were seamen first class; in June, petty officers third class—half way to the goal, Summer shore leave!

SEPTEMBER 1938

Hurricane!! The cruiser STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE rode gallantly through the storm. Damage was done, but not enough to keep the ship tied up. Anchors aweigh!

A new admiral took over the duties of commissioner; another officer, in charge of languages and law, was added to the roster, while another, in charge of athletics and hygiene, took over the duties of one transferring to another ship.

This year, the sailors receiving commercial pedagogical training began to specialize in either the work of the yeoman or that of the special investigator. However, they were guided and inspired in many of the same classrooms. The mysteries bulk-line cost, the ogive and normal curve, Sedan and Stresa, the Federal Reserve system, the Munroe and Burroughs, annuities, geographical and alphabetical filing, mastery of the facts, and communication, transportation and civil service were revealed during this part of the trip.

A loss which was sincerely mourned by both the enlisted personnel and officers was the death of the officer in charge of bookkeeping.

Of course, in the quick scanning of the pages of the ship's log, it must not be forgotten that many of the commercial group had served on hosts of committees, won honor and distinction in the various specialty clubs, sports and cooperative adventures and had participated in plays, proms and programs.

At the end of the third year it is recorded that forty-two had advanced to the rating of petty officer first class. (Four of the original forty-five had left, while one, who had been ashore on leave, came aboard to complete the journey.) Heigh-ho! No duty until September!

SEPTEMBER 1939

The last year! Get under way!

What ho! A new officer in charge of bookkeeping. Yes, they liked him! And they learned, these sailors, many new things: The party of the first part . . . Dear sir: . . . I move to reconsider the motion . . . the seven cardinal principles . . . Cyrano and his nose . . . the gauge of railways in the United States is four feet, eight and one-half inches . . . the juvenile delinquency . . . line cuts and half tones . . . the sentence method . . . imports and exports . . . the number $2\frac{1}{2}$ pen . . . when teaching basketball . . . push-ups. . . .

Following the mid-year storm and picture posing, it is recorded that the chief petty officers (they had increased their rating, and also their number by one) were assigned to an eight-week period of training aboard other ships in the vicinity, where they were allowed to teach. Hard work, but fun.

Then came the hectic moments . . . finals . . . prom . . . banquet . . . rehearsals . . . hymns . . . gowns . . . baccalaureate . . . class outing . . . planting ivy . . . and finally, commencement . . . and a commision . . . and the farewells and the good wishes for "Smooth sailing."

Elementary History

When Miss Goldsmith returned, we had a get-together at Miss Flanders' home in Swampscott.

This was the year that we developed the mania which was something like a subway rush of running upstairs as if a demon were after us with no other purpose in mind except to get the back seats. We filled in a lot of meaningless blanks and argued over the determination of scores. That seems funny now, but then we heartily disagreed with the curve of distribution. Just about this time, too, we began to have mid-years and finals to cope with.

Our Sophomore year was marked by one great sorrow in the death of one whose memory we respect. Just as she shared so many of our experiences then, so she is a part of our story now.

As Juniors we returned to college with hurricane force—to make a bad pun. (Gosh, that was worse than might have been expected.) An important part of that year was the seminars, as we named them, that we used to hold every spare period in that rear left-hand corner of the Chapel Hall. It seems as if we discussed everything under the sun up in that corner and had more fun than a barrel of monkeys.

This Christmas we had our annual parties with our advisers, Miss Bunton and Mr. Woods. Miss Bunton presented each one in her class with a little flower pot containing a sprig of holly. During the vacation we met in Boston for lunch at "The Hideaway" and to see Charles Laughton in *The Beachcomber*. Do you remember how surprised we were when we returned from this vacation to discover that one of the girls had eloped?

By unanimous vote the best part of our Junior year was the last semester. For nine whole weeks we were in training! Can't you still remember your first class? It was an arithmetic class. You may talk all the theory you want, but until you have even a little experience it doesn't mean so very much.

The long-awaited senior year has rolled around at last, and with it another refreshingly-enlightening training period. At least this year started off well. Let's hope it ends just as well.

In the distribution (or should we say presentation) of faculty advisers we were most fortunate. With Miss Wallace and Mr. Woods to give us any assistance we might require, how could we go astray? Evidently the converse doesn't apply, for Mr. Woods hied himself off to the hospital in the middle of winter and the only assistance we could give him was in the form of good wishes.

One afternoon we went to Boston to the theatre to see that most excellent of plays, *Abe Lincoln in Illinois*, starring Raymond Massey. During our February vacation (a week or so after the famous blizzard of 1940) we saw Spencer Tracy in the motion picture version of Kenneth Roberts' *Northwest Passage*.

From the vacation onward we wandered through a maze of class dues, rings, pictures, year book sittings, themes, reports, papers, exams, and a conglomeration of senior responsibilities. "Wandered," for that best describes the impatience we felt with the duties we must perform when all the while our thoughts were on the future we hoped to fashion for ourselves. A future a little fearful to approach, but one which beckoned most enticingly.

That future stretches before us, a future we cannot meet together, but which is for each of us a new and individual undertaking. It is a fascinating ideal, for it embodies all our hopes, our dreams, and our ambitions. It enhances our imagination and acts as the spur to lead us on. May that future see the fulfillment and the realization of those things of which you've dreamed these past years.

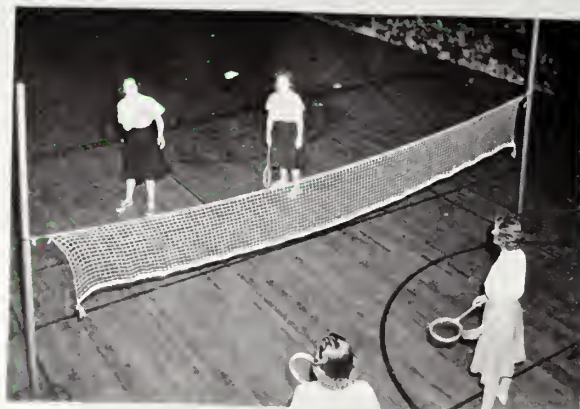
