## Foreword

We have selected the works of John Milton to emphasize the theme of our yearbook because we feel that although they are three hundred years old, they are still appropriate today.

In his twin poems, *L'Allegro* and *Il Penseroso*, Milton expressed two attitudes toward life — the joyful and the sorrowful. In this *Clipper* we have recorded the lights and shadows of our years at Salem. We have had joys, and we have had sorrows. How could it be otherwise when our college days have also been the days in which our country was engaged in the bloodiest war the world has ever known?

As our commencement approaches, a commencement for the world is also approaching — a time when mankind must begin to shape a lasting peace. We realize that now is the time for discussion and decision and, above all, for democratic action. A democracy cannot function without a free-thinking, free-speaking people. Many of Milton's works also reveal him to be a man of these same ideals. In 1644, in his *Acropagitica*, he expressed his belief in freedom of speech, freedom of thought, and freedom of the press. Let us repeat fervently the words of Wordsworth, "Milton, thou should'st be living at this hour!"

## The President's Message

Life is a kaleidoscope of happiness and grief. The older we grow the more we appreciate the truth of this observation. Even when we are very young, before the panorama of the years begins fully to unfold, we become habituated to an admixture of laughter and tears. But youth is naturally buoyant, spirited, more likely to react from depression, and its days of sorrow are usually overshadowed by longer periods of joy. Maturity brings keener perception, more stable reflexes, and with them a realization, born of experience, that to all of us, whatever be our condition, the harvest is both bitter and sweet.

I recall the chorus of an old song which had its origin in Tin Pan Alley:

You're up today and down tomorrow —  
That's the way of life, you know,  
Clouds from sunshine brightness borrow;  
On life's tide we ebb and flow,  
Sun and shadow go together,  
Joy with bitterness and sorrow;  
Darkest clouds bring fairest weather —  
You're up today and down tomorrow.

It is a far cry from the doggerel of this verse to the inspired beauty of *L'Allegro and Il Penseroso*, but their respective philosophy is the same. Milton glorified happiness and grief impartially and with equal skill. His purpose, it seems to me, was to demonstrate the impact of each upon human existence. His own career was marked by misfortune, but surely there was abundant compensation for him in the production of that magnificent poetry which has made his name immortal.

I am writing these words three days after the death of the President of the United States. He was buried at Hyde Park this morning. Yesterday an Arizona newspaper which had consistently opposed his policies published the following front-page box:

### The Man In The Street

"I never voted for him; in fact I campaigned ardently against him. . . . .

"But now that he's gone, there's one thought keeps nagging at me:

"If he wasn't a great man, then why did I feel like crying when I heard that Franklin D. Roosevelt was dead?"

He *was* a great man, a national figure, a world statesman. But, like the lowliest creature in the most forgotten outpost of civilization, his life was a pattern of sad and pleasant realities. For twenty-four years he was plagued by the ravages of infantile paralysis — yet these were the years of his most significant triumphs. Few men in history have suffered as much from criticism; few men have been the object of such extravagant praise.

We are alike in this regard — Franklin Roosevelt, John Milton, the shirt-sleeved song writer, you and I. Life, equally with death, is no respecter of persons. Rich and poor, exalted and humble, educated and illiterate, all share a human heritage of happiness and grief. The oak leaves belong to those who level off above portentous clouds and fly undazzled by the blinding sun.

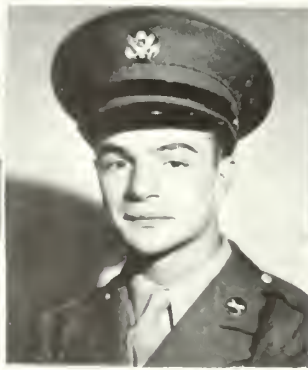

June, 1945

Dear G. I. Joe, Class of 1945:

When you left to serve Uncle Sam I took it upon myself to jot down a few words now and then describing all of the important happenings here at Salem throughout our four years. Although you were not actually with us, you played an important role in all of our college activities. Perhaps as you browse through the various entries you will be able to recapture some feeling of the spirit of the old days.

The first entry is headed Forest River Park, Sept. 12, 1941. The physical examinations for entrance were behind us and I had just arrived home from one of the most bewildering days of my short career. They called it "Orientation Day," but I insisted that there were limits beyond which adjustment could not be brought about. Imagine having aptitude tests all morning, luncheon in the gym with junior sisters introducing us to everyone in sight, and the speeches: "Welcome to STC"; "Join a club"; "Pay your blanket fee"; "Use the catalogue in the library." With bulging eyes we were led around the building for a tour of inspection and later turned loose to scream our approval to newly-made friends. These, of course, are the things I remember now, but when that letter was written I seemed primarily concerned with the astonishing discovery that there were men in the college, enough for at least three football teams!

Oct. 10, 1941 — Today I went to school in a long nightgown, made fifteen pigtailed of my curly locks, carried my books in a bushel basket, wore a string of onions around my neck. No, we weren't crazy, but I was being initiated by a secret clan calling themselves "honorable sophomores." "Wipe that smile off your face." "Carry these books, and these, and these." "Blackout — hit the floor!" The worms we dug, the poetry we memorized, and the shows we put on will never be found in museum records, but as long as the class of '45 lives, the memories of initiation will ever call forth heart-felt laughter. Remember the banquet and those four skits? The "CCC Boys" — or Christopher Columbus nearly brought the roof down, and the actors of "School Days in Pantomime" spread word around of a proffered Broadway contract. The elementary offering of "Li'l Abner" showed evidence of material for a female wrestling team — those bodies all over the stage! The Parisian fashion show revealed a certain charm that has followed these Junior High sophisticates throughout their sojourn at Salem.

We held our first class election this month. Naturally, each of us expected to be president. "The best man won." Ruthie Boyce was our first president, Barbara Norton, the vice-president, Anne Haggarty, the secretary, and Tony Sanella held the purse strings.

The man-shortage problem hadn't presented itself quite so forcefully back in Nov. 12, 1941, with the result that most of us managed a date for the Freshman Frolic. It was really a gay affair with Virginia reels, waltzes, a conga line and ah, sweet swing! Not even our best friends were aware that some of us had robbed the local high school of its star quarterback for the evening.

Dec. 9, 1941 — Today we heard President Roosevelt declare war on the Axis countries. The words came to us from the radio in the hall. Surrounding the stage, with determined but almost unbelieving expressions, were boys like you, whom I had grown to respect. I respect you even more now, because upon you rests the duty of restoring peace to the world.

We all changed after that moment, not visibly, but from within. Without forgetting how to laugh and wisecrack, we took up new tasks. Shall you ever forget your first furlough and being bandaged and "splinted" for a broken arm and leg? The only thing you didn't imitate very well was a victim of sunstroke. It seemed more as if you were stricken with internal injuries, the way you doubled



up from laughter. The air-raid precaution course that was given prepared many a prospective lady air-raid warden for active duty. On the occasions when simulated air-raids were carried out at school, it never occurred to me that you might some day face the real thing.

We gave blood, sent food to you Salem boys in the service, saved newspapers, and wiped the perspiration from our brows as we struggled with artificial respiration. Conference sports were discontinued for the "duration," a new word in our vocabulary that meant "when Johnny comes marching home." The Navy V-1 course became popular among men in the college, and for a while we had visions that the government might take over our fair college, and flood the campus with eligible midshipmen. Unfortunately, this excellent plan never materialized, and as time went on we watched our men gradually disappear from the halls of Salem.

May, 1942 — There are two things we shall always remember about this particular month of May — the sunny hours we spent lying on the rocks at Forest River Park and the long succession of banquets. All kinds of food were still plentiful, so we did not have to contend with substitutes. We gorged ourselves with ice cream and sat back while the upperclassmen made the speeches. Adjudged one of the best of these affairs was the W.A.A. banquet. This may have been because some of the Freshmen took the oath as members of the Executive Board. Do you remember the little song that always seemed to pop up around our banquet tables — "Here is table number one, Where is table two?"

June, 1942 — We all returned to college on the morning of June 9, to take part in Move-up exercises. Final exams were behind us and we clung to these last few hours together before taking up our summer war jobs. Ours was always a singing class and our voices on this particular morning may well have been heard as far away as Plum Island. In the afternoon we adjourned to Salem Willows where we ate, swam, sang, and talked of the coming year. Healthily exhausted and groaning about our sunburns, we said goodbye until another year.

Sept. 1942 — This early fall month found us once again behind our desks with books propped up before us. It didn't seem quite possible at first that the initiation process could have reversed itself in so short a time. Last year we had received, but now it was our turn to give. We readily became experts in the art of meting out daily duties to quivering freshmen, an art perfected only after hours of lengthy consultation among Sophomore bigwigs.

The frosh kept the entire college in an uproar until the fateful night of the Initiation banquet. We saw to it that they provided an excellent program for wildly appreciative upperclassmen. To add to the fun and excitement, Commercial Sophomore I was announced to have the "most effective" table with "Priorities of 1942."

The class officers for the current year were: president, Bob Sheehan; vice president, Catherine Williams; secretary, Louise Carter; treasurer, Barbara Norton. Our first class activity was the roller-skating party at the North Shore Rolladrome. For many it was the first attempt at skating in a rink, but after one or two slight upsets they were ready to compete with the veterans.

In December everyone was discussing plans for acceleration, however, no one seemed to be in favor of it because it would leave even less time in which to earn that essential tuition money. Boys of the month were Bob Sheehan, Eddie Tobin, and Rusty Lodi. The trio joined the Coast Artillery and soon left to take up their Army duties. Chris Eliopoulos went when the Army reserve was called; Jack McLaughlin answered the Navy call; Jim Parks went to the Army. They all went so suddenly that there was little time for goodbyes, but Dick Rossi expressed what we all felt in his poem:



"Lo! The Vanishing Sophomore"

Eight commercial sophomores; wasn't Salem heaven!  
Away went Sheehan, then there were seven.

Seven little students, all were in a fix;  
Tobin heard the bugle call, then there were six.

Six sagacious sophomores, glad to be alive;  
The draft caught Lodi, then there were five.

Five anxious classmates, not so happy as before;  
McLaughlin joined the Navy, then there were four.

Four fidgetty fellows: Chris, Joe, Jim, and me;  
Christy got a letter, then there were three.

Three silly sophomores; none knew what to do;  
Jimmy chose the Air Corps, then there were two.

Two restless remnants sit from sun to sun;  
Waiting for the mailman, then there'll be none.

March, 1943 — In response to the assembly committee's call for local talent, the Elementary Sophomores entertained the college during lecture period. Their show, "This is the Army," was the talk of the college for months, and everywhere they went other students stared and pointed them out as stars of that production. The end men were nothing short of sensational, but the success of the show was made possible by the combined efforts of the entire class.

April, 1943 — Along with the usual signs of spring this year we saw two new black-and-gold signs in the front of the campus announcing to all passers-by that this is the "State Teachers College at Salem, Mass." They were the gift of the class of 1942 and will help to end all controversy as to the exact title of this institution. There will be no more of this "Normal School" business.

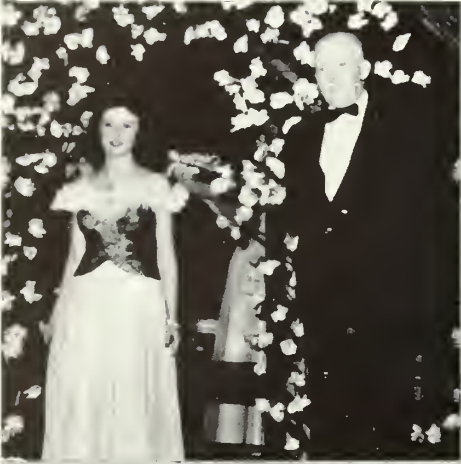
Salem night was reserved at the Boston Pops on a lovely May evening. Alumni and students filled many tables, applauding the famous orchestra heartily after the various selections. We all agree that an annual trip to Pops should be included on each social calendar in the years to come.

June, 1943 — With the usual procession of banquets and parties our Sophomore year came to a successful end, and with it the completion of one half of our college work. Who knows what the future holds?

September, 1943 — We began the year with our newly-acquired freshman sisters. We couldn't restrain the flood of memories that took us back to our own first year. In some freshman sister we could see our counterpart of two years before. We've come a long way since then but with the exception of a larger store of knowledge, we really haven't changed. Perhaps we have a little more sense and certainly we're not so arrogant as we were when we were mistreating the frosh our sophomore year! Knowledge has a humbling effect on most people.

No sooner did we arrive in school than we began work on the J.C.C. — (not the Junior Commando Corps as reported by some wiseacre.) The chapel notices beckoning us to rehearsals constituted a veritable plague. Chapel speakers practically threw up their hands in horror when confronted by unidentified meters — or shall we call it free verse?

Weren't you glad, Joe, that you went to Salem so that you could rate one of the Christmas boxes that the C.D.C. sent to all of you. The student body contributed food, cigarettes, and reading material but the real work of packaging and mailing was done by those wonderful C.D.C. girls.



Anne Murphy was selected to be the pilot of our class this year. Dot Carlson accepted the vice-presidency and Lucille Sewell and Sylvia Bergman became our treasurer and secretary respectively. Peg Fielding and Anne Suomela took the honors in the engagement department, with Peg becoming Mrs. John Davey shortly afterward.

We all had special thanks to offer at Thanksgiving. Even with a war going on, things can seem pretty bright when we stop to count our blessings. For one thing we were thankful for the vacation and for another thing, we were thankful for the decision handed down by the State Legislature to make \$1200 the minimum salary for teachers.

"Jee, you may rave for hours about a certain U.S.O., but you just haven't seen anything until you see one of the shows put on by our class." This bit of wisdom I discovered in a letter dated November, 1943. That was over a year ago and the school at large has yet to recover from the astounding success of "Hip! Hip! Hooray!" I think I mentioned that admission consisted of the purchase of a bond or war stamps. \$1202 was realized from the production, enough to buy a jeep. I'm certain that wherever that jeep is today it's serving an extra purpose, because that was a very special show. Can you imagine such stars as Vera Vague, Sonja Henie, Betty Grable, Anne Miller, Betty Hutton and Frank Sinatra (or reasonable facsimiles) gracing the stage at Salem? Classic remark of the year came from little Miss Lynne Lowrey (the Coach's daughter) who inquired of her father during one of the prettiest numbers, "What's a paper doll, Daddy?"

I entered your picture in the "Pin-up Boy Contest" but unfortunately an even handsomer Army corporal was the winner. The contest was limited to men, but Jean Tucker would have been the winner in any of our pin-up girl contests, because she was the first girl in our class to join the armed forces. Jean is now a lady Marine. Many of us would have liked to join her, but we're sticking to our guns as future teachers.

February, 1944 — The W.A.A.'s decided to carry out tradition regardless of war-time conditions, and their dance was a formal affair. Stella Dawyskiba made a very charming queen. Dot Carlson and that girl with the smile in her voice, Ruth Sheridan, were stars of the Glee Club's Valentine Pops Concert. Music still reigns supreme on our list of entertainment preferences. Salem talent was carried into our homes when our contestants took part in the radio show "Quiz of Two Cities." With publicity like that we'll soon be able to take our place beside members of the Ivy League. We lost one of our favorite men in the month of March, too. Dick Rossi left for the Navy, wreathed in smiles as we said goodby with promises to write. There was no one to set the occasion down in verse but Commercial I held a wonderful party for him.

April 29, 1944 — "I'll be with you in apple-blossom time." Even though that tender bit of sentiment isn't coming true for us this year, the Junior Prom queen will be crowned to the strains of its lovely refrain. No one will be the wiser if she is escorted by her sixteen-year-old cousin, the one, of course, who looks almost seventeen. Despite my ten thumbs, I helped to make the prom decorations under the direction of patient Eva Peterson. Apple blossoms galore, and a crown for the queen were fashioned from crepe paper.

There always seems to be a certain enchantment about college proms and ours was no exception. Dates materialized out of the air for some, and others went through with the young-cousin idea. The setting was The Sheraton, and the girl of the night was Frances Finnerty, queen of all. And so another fond memory was added to our already bulging collection.

Do you still have the picture of our new recreation room that I sent to you? It was very shiny and new that spring, but now it has a more comfortable,



lived-in look. At first it felt very strange to be able to relax a tired body on a big deep sofa, but we are learning to accustom ourselves to our newly-found luxury. This room was quite an undertaking for the students, and was made possible by the increased blanket fee.

Graduation meant a great deal more to most of us this year, because some were chosen to take part in the activities. For a while it looked as if there would be no daisies for the chain, but two small lasses gathered large baskets of them at the last minute from some unsuspecting farmer's field. Daisies aren't daisies without the little black bugs that inevitably accompany them, much to the horror of the eight young women involved. The laurel chain girls looked lovely in their white dresses and were not only beautiful but also helpful at the Senior Tea. It was nice to have a pre-view of what our own graduation will be like. The setting is always the same; only the players are changed.

September, 1944 — We are Seniors. Does it sound strange to you, Joe? It shouldn't, because we're the same crowd you knew almost three years ago. We still cut classes to stroll down to Forest River Park on a warm day, loek each other in the record room, dance in the gym at noon, and play a wicked game of hockey; we're not beyond wearing our hair in pigtails occasionally. It doesn't seem possible that we're approaching the end of our college days. It's bound to be the best year, because we have so much to draw upon from past experiences.

November, 1944 — I was right in saying that this is definitely the best year. Most of the Junior Highs and Elementaries found themselves in the training school for the first eight weeks but being seasoned veterans they couldn't help but enjoy the antics of the younger generation. Practically everyone turned out for the first social event of the year — The Barn Dance. "Heel-and-toe, and step-and-slide!" "Swing your partner" and don't slip on the hayseed or be scared by the pumpkins. That was a night to delight the strong of heart and the sure of foot. We all tried hard to look like Early Americans with our denim jeans and plaid shirts, but many a jitterbug step was detected in the "step-together-slide."

We never lost sight of our duties in the war effort. To assure the sale of a certain amount of war stamps each week, we all subscribed to the new stamp pledge system. To spur us on, an army jeep, complete with soldier, appeared one noon in our back yard at school. We inspected the jeep very carefully to see if it showed any evidences of being the one purchased last year with our returns from "Hip! Hip! Hooray!" Those C.D.C. girls renewed their efforts, armed with even better ideas for the year ahead. Mel Harding was injured in a plane crash but he came out smiling.

February 5, 1945 — News of our new show, already in rehearsal, has leaked out. Everywhere underclassmen were whispering, "That class of '45 is at it again. Anything can happen." It did, on the night of February 20. Some day after the war is over we're all going to get together again and put on all three of our shows, exclusively for you neglected servicemen who had to be satisfied with glowing descriptions. But how can I describe a musical review? I can't sing songs heard only in exclusive Parisian cafes on paper, nor can I ad lib on paper. I can't help you to hear the sound of applause from a satisfied audience, but I can help to make that promise come true.

Several excellent lecture periods brightened the dreary days of January and February. Almost everyone in the college was present to hear Bernard Hagar, the concert pianist. We were thrilled by his brilliant rendition of Debussy, Beethoven, Gershwin, and the beloved Chopin. Mr. Hagar had a winning personality, and we were grateful for the suggestions he made regarding important things to listen for in the various works.



The children from the training school have entertained us in most enjoyable Chapel programs. Everyone seemed continually amazed that children are capable of producing such sweet music. The little fellow who so unconcernedly sang about "saddling" his old "straddle," instead of the reverse, endeared himself to the hearts of all listeners. Some of us had hardly realized that spring had arrived until these children serenaded us with songs of robins, flowers, and sunshine.

May 10, 1945 — Spring brought us something new this year; something beside the cheery calls of bright birds, crocuses hiding in hedges, and a warm sun to bring the earth to life again. It also gave us renewed hope for certain victory in Europe.

The end was in sight, but Franklin Delano Roosevelt, the man who had guided our great country through this unprecedented crisis, died on April 12. Though he died on the eve of your victory in Europe, his passion for peace has had a profound effect upon all liberty-loving peoples. As I write, plans for a permanent peace structure are being discussed in San Francisco by delegates from forty-eight nations. We pray for the success of the Conference, our last hope for a world at peace.

We are truly a "War" class. We had been in college only a few months when Congress declared war against the Axis powers, and on May 8, a few weeks before Commencement, V-E Day came.

Impressive V-E Day exercises were held in the Assembly Hall, and we shall long remember President Sullivan's moving poem. I'm quoting it for you.

Because they offered all they had to give,  
Because they understood — and paid — the cost,  
Saying, "What matter though we die or live?  
This fight must not be lost,"  
They are true patriots, our motherland,  
Yea, first and very staunchest of thy sons —  
In the bright after-years worthy to stand  
With those imperial ones  
Who fought for Poland, and with those who stood  
Unconquerable before that mad advance  
Which poured like a torrential tide of blood  
Into the fields of France.  
True patriots, for when they heard thee call,  
Not grudgingly, but with an eager heart  
They came — and each in the mad carnival  
Played his allotted part,  
Saying, "What matter though we die or live?"  
Giving until there was no more to give.

June 1, 1945 — I wish you might be here to share with us the climax of four years of fun and hard work. Our calendar for June is full, and in order to carry out the program we shall certainly need constitutions of iron.

Tuesday, June 12, is THE DAY. COMMENCEMENT!

Our one regret, G. I. Joe, is that you will not receive your degree with us. The postponement, however, is only one of the sacrifices you have made in the cause of Liberty and Justice. Every teacher will carry on in your spirit, so that America's youth may know the true meaning of this great struggle for freedom.
