The President's Message

"We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union . . ." There are approximately fifty words in the preamble to the Constitution of the United States, but they may be epitomized in a single deathless phrase — "universal tolerance." Tolerance is the foundation upon which America was built. Without it there would be no "justice" no "domestic tranquility," no provision for "the common defense" or "the general welfare." Without tolerance "the blessings of liberty" would be nothing but a sham.

Read down the record since the Revolution. Why has the immigrant, in such overwhelming numbers, sought the refuge of these shores? Why have we prospered beyond the dreams of our ancestors? Why have we stood invincible against the forces which would destroy us? Because the principles upon which this nation was founded are solid and steadfast and true. Because here there are, and there have been through the years, intolerance of oppression, hatred of injustice, contempt for treachery against beneficent government, and the courage to fight for the objectives of democratic sovereignty in the face of the most formidable opposition, and regardless of race or color or creed.

As long as those beliefs are held by the vast majority of our citizens, the greatness of America will endure. As long as we give to our people the absolute right to worship their Creator according to their own convictions and to seek legitimate happiness according to their own desires, no power on earth can prevail against us. Economic troubles may beset us from time to time. Depressions and recessions may come and go. Poverty and unemployment may recur at intervals and become widespread. But these are problems which can and will be solved by intelligent study and application and patience. The problems which defy solution are those which will arise if we lose sight of the principles of American freedom and give ourselves over to the mad tyranny and brutal intolerance of other lands.

Free people are happy people. History is evidence of that fact. It is only when freedom is permitted to degenerate into license that nations begin to decay. Races and religions may be persecuted for a time with impunity but in the end, revolt is inevitable and tyranny is overthrown. Freedom is the natural state of man. It should be limited only by the restrictions of duly constituted authority and duly enacted legislation. Tolerance is a by-product of freedom, and a natural inheritance of every American since the signing of the Declaration of Independence and the ratification of the Constitution under which we work and live.

There can be no justification, in reason or in law, for the persecutions which have been visited by Hitler and Hirohito upon those whom they hope to destroy. The sympathy of every thinking American goes out to the harassed victims of these iniquitous purges. No government so constituted can permanently endure. Either the policy of intolerance must be repudiated and removed, or the nations which profess it will be ultimately overthrown. Nations prosper in proportion to the liberties which their peoples enjoy. Again, history is evidence of that fact. No dictator, however powerful, can mock the experiences of history or spurn the rights of man.

Salem Diary 1940-1941

- September 17 We've been here for three days and the honorable Upperclassmen have already dubbed us "young and green"! Guess we must look as bewildered as we feel, but there are so many people and so many stairs and the rooms are hidden in the oddest corners! Whoever designed this building must have had a bitter feeling in his heart for Freshmen. At least it's a consolation to know that we aren't the only new ones around here. This is Miss Barlow's first year as a supervisor of Grade 6 at the Training School, so she must be feeling the same way we're feeling now.
- These Upperclassmen are a little hard to understand. They aren't exactly unfriendly, but they have the strangest gleam in their eye!
- October 14 If we can just get through this week, nothing will ever bother us again. Initiation began today and already we've done more insane things and felt sillier than ever before in our lives. The meaning of that gleam in the eyes of the Upperclassmen is becoming more and more apparent every second. Even if we do survive this ordeal, we won't have a shred of dignity left!
- October 18 We're in! There were times there that we thought we'd never make it, but we've all been duly initiated and accepted, and the wicked gleam has entirely disappeared. The week's tortures were wound up tonight with a banquet, and the fact that one of our tables walked off with a prize went a long way in restoring some of our self respect. When everything was over we looked around us with new confidence. Odd, but that greenish tinge has nearly all worn off!
- November 1 Some of us ventured to the first dance of the season last night, the Senior Barn Dance. Plenty of fun, and no casualties. Now that we are organized and have elected our own officers, we're really getting into the swing of things. Good officers we have, too. Larry Fortin is our commander-in-chief, and he will be assisted by Bob O'Neil, Lucille Breen, and Bernard Wolfson. With officers like these to lead us and with our pioneer spirit we predict big things to come.
- December 17 Three milestones have been passed this month. We had our first real and exclusive activity on December 9 when we held our Freshman Christmas Party, and today our ranks were honored when three of our members took part in the Christmas plays. Bernie Wolfson played the leading role in "The Bishop's Candlesticks", while Abbie Connor and Milton Richards also took part. Another claim to fame is Herbie Sullivan who secured the Pitman Medal for us when he won the annual Declamation Contest with Rienzi's "Address to the Romans". This has been quite a month.
- January 6 Heard Professor de Haas of Harvard for the first time today, and found him both interesting and enlightening. We might have enjoyed him even more if we hadn't been so busy worrying over our first mid-year exams. They are gradually

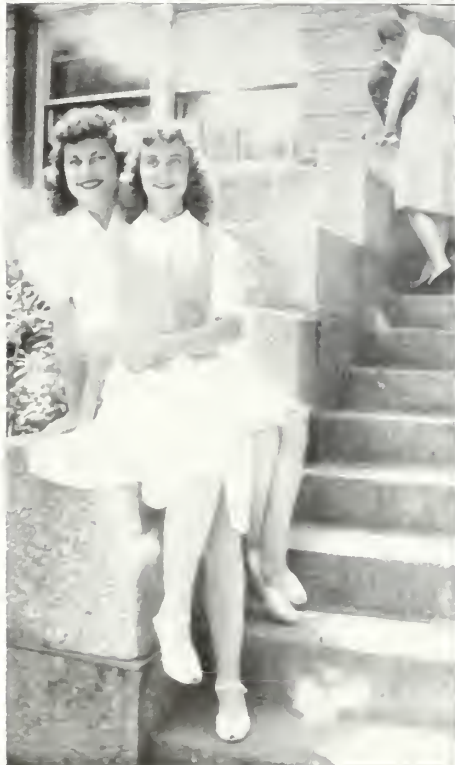


creeping up on us and are due to overwhelm us in two weeks. One hundred and twenty-nine sets of fingernails are rapidly being gnawed to the quick!

- January 15 Exams start tomorrow. Give us strength!
- January 22 Whoever said that mid-years were something to worry about? Why, there's nothing to them. Now to gain back those fifteen pounds.
- March 26 Salem was invaded tonight by the Bowdoin Glee Club and Band. They joined with our own Glee Club in the presentation of the "Music Parade". And speaking of presentations, seven members of our ranks were presented the honor of making the President's List for the first semester.
- May 8 Today the Literary-Dramatic Club put on a production of "The Ghost Train", a three-act thriller. We enjoyed the chills and general hair-raising even more because Frosh Wolfson, Sullivan, and Kane took part.
- May 16 Well, we've really scored a victory! Defying past tradition and starting what we hope will become a new one, tonight we staged the first Freshman dance to be held at the college. In former years financial risk has held the Freshmen back, but not so with us. Considering that it was our first venture everything went off very well. Maybe those Upperclassmen know that we're alive now!
- June 10 We said our goodbyes today to the Seniors. It's going to seem strange around here next year without some of those familiar faces. But we didn't have time to be sad; we were too excited about moving up. It was a little hard to realize as we turned back our capes that we had come up one step in the world — that we were actually Sophomores.

1941 - 1942

- September 16 How different it seemed getting back this year, and how nice to be addressed in reverent tones. *Sophomores*, that word has a lovely sound! It was a disappointment to learn, however, that we had suffered several casualties during the summer. Twenty-two of us failed to return, but the ninety-nine of us who are still here intend to make up for them.
- September 25 We've caused some more eyebrow-raising and head-nodding by introducing another innovation. In addition to our regular class officers who are to be Bob O'Neil, president; Marion Gates, vice-president; Grace Jackson, minutes-woman; and Althea Dillon, guardian of the till, we've elected an advisory board composed of one representative from each division to exercise a guiding hand over the activities of these officers. Our class is earning a reputation as instigators.



October 5

In a brief twelve months' time we seem to have forgotten that we weren't going "to treat the poor Freshmen that way next year". The solemn vow seems to have slipped Harry Kane's mind completely. He of the whip and evil eye has already been dubbed "Simon Legree" by this year's "young and green ones". The only Freshman in our midst that no one has got around to hazing is that very pleasing addition to the faculty, Miss Elizabeth Murphy of the Commercial Department.

December 9

Five of our men had a conference with President Sullivan today to learn what we can do to help the college become accredited. As soon as we find out what part we students can play in accreditation we will begin working toward that goal. With men like Bob O'Neil, Herb Sullivan, Harry Kane, Milton Richards, and Bernie Wolfson leading us on, something should come of it soon. Chalk up another one for the Class of '44.

January 17

This seems to be a month of "firsts". A new absentee system has been inaugurated allowing as many absences as there are semester hours in a course, and the Book Club held its first annual Fair Week in the hope that it will become a custom. We hope so too.

February 16

Surprise of the year came today when the Sophomore class basketball team stole the title of "college Champs" from under the very noses of the Seniors.

February 20

Everyone is all out for defense! Special A.R.P. and First Aid courses have been organized and it's impossible to move anywhere in the building without meeting someone muttering "out with the bad air, in with the good air" over someone else's prostrate form. A new organization called the Collegiate Defense Committee has been established to keep in touch with Servicemen, and a Salem Day has been set aside at the Boston Red Cross Blood Donor Center. Thirty of us have already signed up to make our donation.

March 20

If we see another test within two weeks we just won't be responsible for our actions! After three long days of participation in the National Testing Project, concensus of opinion has it that the Sophomores prefer their classes any day — profiles or no profiles.

April 10

We opened our Tahiti Room tonight and it was something that we shall never forget! For the last three weeks we've all been sewing like the Six Little Tailors to get our leis and palm leaves done on time, but it was worth every stitch! Betty Murphy and her decoration committee had transformed the Chapel Hall into a tropical paradise complete with full moon and palm trees. Every time another couple came in our hearts got lighter, and by the time two hundred and fifty people were crowding the hall, we were ready to turn handsprings. Yesterday we had another boost to our egos when Grace Jackson was elected Council Secretary — the only Sophomore to make the Council election.



April 17

The first member of our faculty to be inducted into service during this war left today and there were many long faces around the corridors. Mr. Hardy, one of our favorites, has traded his books for a lieutenant's uniform, and Salem has lost a really fine teacher. "Gone but not forgotten" is a trite phrase, but in this instance it holds true. We'll miss him!

1942 - 1943

September 16

There've been some changes made! We returned to find that we have two new faces in the faculty's midst. Miss Helen Keily is filling Mr. Hardy's shoes in the Commercial Department, while Miss Adele Driscoll has taken over the supervision of the sixth grade at the Training School. We found that Mr. Whitman had been awarded a fellowship for his untiring efforts in the field of Science. Since Mr. Whitman has always been a favorite of ours, we think that the Council of the American Association for the Advancement of Science couldn't have made a better choice. Oh, yes, another discovery! Our ranks have dwindled to a mere eighty-three students — but we're still going strong.

October 30

Bob O'Neil was rewarded for his fine navigation of last year by being elected to a second term. Phyllis Shrager, Peggy Royal, and Betty Murphy will be his assistants this year.

December 3

At a beautiful and impressive ceremony today, the Kappa Delta Phi Fraternity, Beta Chapter, presented a memorial plaque honoring the late Lt. James Attridge, Jr., the first Salem alumnus to give his life in this war.

December 8

The war seems to be rearing its ugly head everywhere. Now, after a year of it, its effects can easily be seen, not only in our dwindling enrollment, but in our activities as well. Due to the man-scarcity, for the first time in the history of Salem Coastguardsmen were invited to provide partners for the girls at the Harvest Hop. Another precedent was shattered when the gas and rubber shortages were responsible for transforming the *Log Dance* from the regular formal affair to a Rainbow Record Hop.

January 30

After the hectic business of exams, it was a relief to get into the social swim again with the *Clipper Dance* and the W.A.A. Formal. Speaking of the Formal, sure proof that our class possesses pulchritude as well as spirit was the fact that Betty Murphy and Jean Dwyer were chosen as members of the queen's court. Evidently we aren't too bad as Thespians either, as the Junior play, "The Heritage of Wimpole Street", took first prize at the Tournament Plays last week.

February 5

We wished Miss Roberts well and admired her beautiful engagement ring for the last time today when she left Salem to prepare for her forthcoming marriage to a New York civil engineer. She'll be missed, not only in her classroom, but at those annual assembly programs where she gave us so much pleasure with her music.



February 18

We've won another battle! The results of the Council elections were announced today, and Grace Jackson will be our president for the coming year. In spite of the fact that our class smashed all previous records by adding her name to the original ballot with the list of presidential nominees, Grace won by a landslide! Two other '44-ites, Mary Donovan and Barbara Walsh, will serve as vice-president and treasurer respectively.

February 19

Orchids to Norma Smith for getting our physical fitness program a little publicity! During these last few months when we were in the gym doing those Commando tactics, or when we suffered with that "morning after" feeling as we hiked up to the third floor, we often wondered if we'd get any recognition for our pains. It was certainly gratifying today when, thanks to Norma, the Boston Herald-Traveler sent a reporter and a photographer down so that our W.A.A. program could be featured on the "Spot Shot" page. Guess the Traveler will have a few more steady customers until we see our muscles in print!

March 14

It could be spring fever or a vitamin deficiency, but this exhausted, run-down feeling is probably due to our first whack at training. Who ever persuaded us that teaching was a cinch, anyway?

April 30

That "on-again-off-again" Junior Prom of ours finally did come off tonight at the Hotel Bradford Roof! Because of the new difficulties in transportation, and that age-old difficulty — men, we were a little undecided whether or not to go through with the affair. Tonight, when we saw Eva LeBlanc walking up to be crowned Queen of the Prom, with her attendants, Peggy Royal, Mary Gavin, Norma Smith, Muriel Constantine, Jean Dwyer, and Betty Murphy scattering petals in her path, we knew that we'd done the right thing!

May 21

We've stolen a march by electing our *Clipper* Staff for next year a few months earlier. Alice Manning will head the staff, assisted by an able crew. Speaking of elections, at the W.A.A. banquet last night, Grace Hanly was chosen leader of the association for the coming year. Looks as if 1944 will be our best one yet!

1943 - 1944

September 17

And then there were seventy-nine! It's rather hard to believe that when we started out in 1940 there were one hundred and twenty-nine of us, but the roadway during these last three years has been beset with many temptations. Those of us who have escaped Cupid's darts, the draft, and the lure of high-salaried defense jobs are back today ready to make our last year the biggest one! We took time out to welcome an alumnus back into the fold, this time as an instructor. Mr. V. John Rikkola, Class of 1935, has returned to take Miss Barlow's place as seventh grade supervisor at the Horace Mann Training School.



September 29

Bang! That's the way everything has started off this year. Losing no time we set the example by holding early elections and choosing Celia Noonan as our president. Grace Driscoll as treasurer, Priscilla Hingston as vice-president, and Kay Costello as secretary were selected as aides-de-camp to guide the affairs of our all-important year. We'd scarcely settled down to our studies when the Collegiate Defense Committee had the Victory Roll Letters outside of the library, and was calling for Christmas presents to send to our boys overseas.

October 5

Well, there is hope for us after all! We've found someone who numbers us Salem Seniors among possible brides-to-be! The Towle Silver Company, through the efforts of Barbara Walsh, visited Salem today to get our opinions on some of their new patterns. Each of us chose the two patterns she liked the best in the group, but we all chose the Towle Company as our friend.

October 16

J.C.C.! J.C.C.! We've been hearing that every day in the cafeteria, in Chapel, — everywhere we go! Curiosity is getting the better of us. What does it all mean?

October 30

The gym was at its best tonight for our Barn Dance, trimmed with corn husks, hay stacks, and men! We defied convention again by holding this first dance of the season on a Saturday night, and by entertaining soldiers as guests. A vote of thanks is due to Betty Murphy, Eva LeBlanc, Natalie Amanti, Marion Gates, Charlotte Williams, Adele Magwood, Electa Gayton, and Phyllis Shrager for producing such an outstanding success!

November 23

It's out at last! Now we know that J.C.C. stands for Junior Class Canteen and an afternoon of great entertainment. We have to hand it to these Juniors for coming forth with such a burst of talent, and such a brilliant idea for the sale of war stamps and bonds. The only admission requirement was the purchase of a stamp or bond, and both the faculty and student body came through one hundred percent. One hundred percent of the audience went away well pleased with the songs, dances, and lavish costumes of the various acts. Needless to say, it pleased us most to find that the Juniors sold over a thousand dollars worth of stamps and bonds — enough to buy a jeep!

January 8

Rhumbas! Sambas! Congas! Our heads are still reeling and our joints are still creaking from our gala evening at the Copacabana. Featuring a Latin-American theme in cabaret style, the staff was responsible for one of the most successful *Clipper* dances since we've been here. Those of us who couldn't stand the strenuous pace of the dancing sat at the tables sipping cokes with the servicemen who were guests of the *Clipper*.

January 29

Those of us who survived exams and still felt rugged went to the W.A.A. formal tonight, and it was not an event for the weak. Although the girls appeared fragile in their gowns they had to be made of sturdy stuff to endure the crush! Never saw the Chapel Hall so well filled. It made us happy to see the Queen's Court graced by three of our seniors: Edna Volk, Grace Hanley, and Norma Smith.



February 14

Dressed in gowns and stepping daintily through paper hearts tonight at the Valentine Pop Concert, the Glee Club girls looked very attractive. They sounded even better where, backed by the Singing Men, they thrilled us with medleys of old fashioned love songs. No doubt about it, this was the best Pops Concert that the Glee Club has ever put on, due to the efforts of Eleanor Fredrickson, who managed it and in addition entertained us with her unforgettable singing of "The Rosary."

March 9

We heard Dr. Tehyi Hsieh, the director of the Chinese Service Bureau in Boston, give an enlightening and entertaining assembly talk on "China's Vital Place in World Democracy". His speech was a welcome change from the mad whirl of engagement parties we've been attending lately. A new diamond seems to be blossoming every week on the finger of some lucky senior, and there have been two or three wedding bands too!

March 14

Today our Commercial Seniors gave a tea, for the first time inviting their parents as well as the members of the faculty. That reminds us, the Commercials will be leaving in a week or so for that training period. These old halls are going to be pretty quiet and empty!

March 19

"Moxie" Izen distinguished himself as a "Quiz Kid" of no little ability, and S.T.C. came in for a share of publicity this afternoon when Salem participated in the "Quiz of Two Cities" program on station WNAC. The fact that our opponents from Rhode Island College of Education downed us by six points didn't bother us a bit. After all, it was only our first attempt.

April 17

After weeks of floor-laying and furniture-covering, the third lunch-room emerged today resplendent as our first recreation room! It started out in a very small way, but like Jack's beanstalk it grew and grew until it had assumed the proportions of a gigantic undertaking. It was worth the effort, we decided when we saw it today for the first time. With comfortable lounges, ping-pong tables, a juke box, and bright new paint, we have a recreation room to be proud of.

May 1

Well, the Freshmen have had their frolic and the Juniors have had their Prom, so we Seniors are giving all our attention to the activities which climax our last year. Committees have been chosen and are already sailing full speed ahead for Commencement Exercises. Marion Gates will have charge of the Reception, Louise Connors, the Class Luncheon, and Grace Hanley, the Tea. Other committee heads are: Anne Paoli, Reception and Entertainment; Marion Roundy, Ivy Exercises; Bella Madow, Last Chapel; Althea Dillon, Class Gift; Jane Kelly, Ushers; Anna Kulberg, Programs and Invitations.

Only now do we fully realize that our days here at S.T.C. are numbered! With all the excitement of finals and graduation, these few remaining weeks will really fly by, and before we know it we'll be "out in the world." But the thought doesn't worry us because we know that we'll be standing on our own feet ready for anything that comes our way, thanks to these four years at Salem.

"We passed through Pensacola and Mobile, Alabama, that day, two good-looking cities. The road that led to Pensacola bordered the bay for nearly ten miles — it was good to see the sea again. We spent the third night in Camp Shelby, Mississippi, and arrived here on Monday afternoon. "Now so disgusted with civilization's petty jealousies, selfishness, and lack of cooperation that until I return for last adventure in Tarzan's Paradise I'm devoting myself to catching up.' However, it has been good to catch up on white men's conversation, clothing, food (milk, eggs, etc.), and even see a white woman wearing a dress."

"You know you really caught me by surprise when you asked me to give a chat to members of Education 40. I had really a lot of things I wanted to say to the class as future teachers, but I got off on the wrong foot, trying to be humorous, and besides my sister was there."

"His (Milton Richards') status is now one of an honorably discharged veteran of World War II, and I'll bet that he is Salem's first."

CPL. HERBERT SULLIVAN—*Camp Edwards, Mass.*

"I am teaching a more advanced phase. This is a three-week phase and covers Radio Receivers."

PFC. WESLEY KAY

"Well here's 'Lucky' Harry again. There must be a plot against my going overseas. All the boys left five days ago—everyone except me. This is the second time. I'm getting disgusted. Twice I miss a sea voyage, all for free.

"I'm pretty uncomfortable now. I've only got pains in my left leg and both shoulders. I wasn't made to lie in bed, and one of these days I'll creep out of bed and steal my clothes and take off out of this blessed state of Utah."

SGT. HARRY S. KANE—*Utah*

"Fortunately, I am in a place where I am out of the rain, but there are some glass panes missing here and they're in the skylights so we might just as well be outdoors. There is no coal, so the heating system is no good. Speaking of the heating system, I may say that it is unique. I may or may not have told you that this building is finished entirely in marble. The walls here on the main banking floors are of white marble, the floors are of gray marble, and trimmings such as pillars, tellers' counters, and tables are of red marble. The heating system, to get back to the original subject, consists of steam pipes laid under the floor, and the place is heated by the hot marble floors."

SGT. JOHN R. FOLSOM, JR.—*Italy*

"This Flying Fortress is really some airplane. It not only has a high performance but is just about the safest thing on wings. I've taken off and flown in weather when even the birds were walking with red flags over their shoulders, but that old Seventeen can weather anything."

2ND LT. JOHN LEE—*Colorado*

"Last week, I left noisy New Orleans and headed for Oklahoma. I'm in a nice quiet (too quiet to suit me) little town called Norman. My new duties are at the University of Oklahoma, which incidentally has a very pretty campus. I am now a second-class Yeoman."

RAY BARBRICK, Y. 3/c—*Oklahoma*

"We really have a nice setup here. No reveille. We get up at any time, just as long as we're ready to muster at 8:25, then three hours of classes until lunch—an hour and a half break—and classes again from 1:30 to 4:00. Usually we have only three hours of classes a day, the remaining two being taken up with drills, movies, and lectures.

The work is strictly Navy, half supply and half disbursing. It's not really hard, just gruelling and technical."
